The St. Alban's Raid Case.—It appears from a Washington despatch that the case of the St. Alban's Raiders is to be admitted for consideration, against Great Britain, before the Mixed Claims Commission appointed to settle the minor matters of difference between Great Britain and the United States. We were under the impression that full satisfaction for the St. Alban's raids had been long since made by Canada, in arresting the raiders, in making the law more stringent and indemnifying those citizens of the United States whose money andvaluables were seized. In the face of the refusal of the Americans to allow our Fenian Raid claims to be even discussed, this new revolation is humiliating in the extreme. Was Sir John A. Macdonald' our "High Joint Commissioner," at Washington at all? Was he in such a state as to know the nature of the instrument he signed? How came he to submit to the spoilation of the honour and interests of Canada? Of one sided affairs, the Treaty of Washington is the most perfect example. Britain has had to pay for the Alabama; has had to apologize for misconduct; Canada has lost her sovereighty of the St. Lawrence, lost her fisheries, and lost in-calculably in the San Juan boundary affair.
