The London Advertiser complains of the conduct of the McGillivray Township Council in totally ignoring the petition of several influential rate-payers of the township, that a by-law be submitted to the ratepayers in favor of a bonus to the London, Huron and Bruce Railway, of \$10,000. The Council took no further notice of the document than to order that it be filed. The proposal of the London, Huron and Bruce Company is to run their railway through the township, something like twelve miles, with a station at the village of Ireland, and another at the town-line between McGillivray and Stephen. This would cause an expenditure of over \$100,000 within the limits of the township.

Grasshoppers are in thousands south of the Grand River in this village, and they have eaten off much of the grass and the commons. Some of the gardens have also been attacked, the cabbage plants eaten, and even the onions are being consumed by the voracious brutes.
