'GRAY-HAIRED LOVERS

Wedded at the Ages of Eighty-Seven and Ninety.

Laporte, Ind., March 25.—John L. Jones, aged 90, and Mrs. J. M. Jones, aged 87, were married yesterday at Laporte, Ind. They were both over 60 years ago. After their engagement they parted, with the understanding that if their love did not grow cold they would be wedded in their old age.

They became separated, and each mourned the other as dead. Both married others. Recently, widower and widow, they were brought together and the vows made half a century ago have just been fulfilled.

THE FIRE RECORD.

Thurso, Que., March 25.—A fire occurred here yesterday, by which Chever's Hotel and a house occupied by Joseph Gagnon were destroyed. Chever had \$2,000 insurance in the Commercial Union; loss was about \$3,000. Edward Trading Company's store was damaged.

Teeswater, March 25.—The Queen's Hotel here, owned and occupied by George La France, was completely destroyed by fire at five o'clock yesterday morning. The inmates, some of whom were small children, barely escaped with their lives, rushing out into the bitter night in bare feet and night clothes; some with their clothes in their hands and some without. Nothing was saved. Loss on building, \$2,000; insured for \$600. The contents were insured for \$900.

Halifax, N. S., March 25.—The Evangeline Hotel, at Berwick, one of the largest in the Annapolis valley, was burned to the ground at 3 a.m. All the occupants had a narrow escape from death, and saved little of their effects. The hotel was owned by G. E. Kirkpatrick. Total insurance, \$1,800.

Berlin, Ont., March 25.—Tuesday morning fire destroyed the baby carriage and hobby horse factory of Wm. Cosgrove, near the G. T. E. station. The factory had only been started one day, after two months' illness. Loss about \$5,000; insurance \$3,000.

IMPERIAL PENNY POSTAGE.

London, March 25.—At a meeting of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom yesterday, a resolution favoring an Imperial penny postage was passed unanimously.

TO RELIEVE ADIGRAT.

Rome, March 25.—Advices received from Massowah state that Gen. Baldisera, commander-in-chief of the Italian forces in Abyssinia, has started from Asmara with a strong force. The object of the expedition is, if possible, to liberate the Italian garrison at Adigrat.

TURKISH OUTRAGES RENEWED

IN CRETE.

London, March 25.—It is reported here that the murder of Christians by the Turks has been renewed on the Island of Crete, and that the latter has appealed to Greece for protection. It is believed that the Turks are waiting for an excuse to inaugurate a general massacre.

AT THEIR OLD TRICKS.

Constantinople, March 25.—The outbreak at Killis is more serious than supposed. The town is now surrounded by troops, and no one is allowed to leave or enter the place. The officials of Bitlis are preventing the American missionaries from departing. Sir Philip Currie, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, has had an interview with Tewfik Pasha, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, on the subject.

KRUGER WARNED.

London, March 25.—The Times warns President Kruger that it is impossible to discuss with him the essentials of the London convention, which fixes the sovereignty of Great Britain over the Transvaal. "In any case," the Times continues, "he must decide without delay whether to accept the invitation to come to England. The invitation cannot remain open indefinitely, and if it is declined he must make arrangements to support the just claims of the Uitlanders."
