

Dr. McEachern expressed the belief that the plague was on the decrease, and thinks if the people interested will do what they are asked to do, the middle of summer will see the last of the plague. He says: "In all suspected cases I would advise the farmers to at once report to us. If disease is found on their farms, which they have not reported, they are liable to a fine of \$200, and debarred from claiming any indemnity for hogs slaughtered. The disease is very easily dealt with, and it can be stopped on a farm with proper precautions. If it is not controlled promptly, it will jeopardize the whole hog raising industry of the peninsula."
