The new \$30,000 central school at Chatham is to be formally opened today (Wednesday).

Pardo's stove mills at Elmhurst are announced to shut down owing to lack of timber.

Sir John Carling was in Seaford last week, and bought a fine horse from Mr. David Donovan.

The millers are hard pressed to get enough wheat to keep running. Farmers are holding, looking for another raise.

A heavy rain storm, accompanied by a strong wind, passed over Ridgeway Sunday night. Some damage was done to the corn.

About 100 Tilsonburg Masons drove over to Otterville Sunday, to attend the funeral of their deceased brother, B. W. Calver.

The death occurred Sunday, at his home, on the 5th con. Raleigh, of John McCombe, a native of Aberdeen, Scotland, at the age of 80 years.

Mr. Louis Elliott, who has been caretaker of the Goderich postoffice for a number of years, has been notified to vacate. George Bissett is named for the position.

Mr. J. R. Paul left Seaford on Monday for Hensall, where he will be manager of the Hensall flax mill. The people of Hensall will find Mr. Paul affable and obliging.

The Strickler farm of 150 acres, lot 2, con. 7, Blandford, was sold last week by the executors at public auction, E. W. Town, auctioneer. Alex. Sims was the purchaser, price \$4,550.

Since July 1 the South Oxford hotels have been keeping open till 11 o'clock, but at a recent meeting of the license commissioners was passed a resolution ordering that they be closed at 10 p.m.

The Golden Cache mine of British Columbia, in which a number of Tilsonburg gentlemen are interested, has been sold at a figure which will allow of a very handsome dividend being paid.

Miss Nina Lee, daughter of William Lee, coal merchant, Goderich, is dangerously ill with spine trouble, caused from a fall from a bicycle. Mr. Lee had the misfortune to lose a grown-up daughter last spring.

Mr. M. T. Burn, who left Tilsonburg Aug. 29 with his poultry exhibit to tour the American fairs, has decided to accept a handsome offer for his entire exhibit. At Syracuse he won \$300 cash prizes. He has the privilege of exhibiting at Cambridge Valley, after which he returns home.

Wood has been received in Chatham that Henrietta Daniels, daughter of Anthony Daniels, formerly of the Green road, Duxbury, had died in the Rhode Island, the result of an injury received some time ago. The deceased was lighting an oil stove, when it suddenly exploded, inflicting burns which ended fatally on Saturday.

In the list of successful candidates in the junior matriculation and school examinations, held in June last, appear the names of Miss E. McKay and Miss A. Robinson, of Woodstock, who obtained first-class honors in modern languages and second-class honors in mathematics, first-class honors in French and German, and second-class honors in English.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Lord Mount Royal on Canada and Her Widening Future.

How and Why Sir Wilfrid Laurier Was Honored as He Was in Britain.

No Fear of the New Fast Line Steamship Project—Gratified With the Prosperity of the Dominion.

Emminently worthy of the highest honors which his sovereign could bestow upon him, it is one of the things about him who, as Sir Donald Smith, was beloved by all classes, that in the high rank to which he has attained the wisdom and simplicity of the man has been in no degree impaired. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal is still the kindly, thoughtful, simple gentleman who, while rightly valuing the favor of his sovereign, as a loyal and dutiful subject, has never striven to make her "true north" prosperous and great, goes in and out with simplicity and unostentatiousness, and, as a warm hearted citizen, has been upon the plane of character rather than that of rank.

His lordship, with us once more, looking so fresh and vigorous as to suggest that he has discovered the secret of perpetual youth. He arrived yesterday from New York, and at an early hour this morning was busy receiving callers, arranging for the reception to the members of the British Medical Association, and shaking the hands of intimate friends in his old, hearty, candid fashion, which he has not forgotten in the multiplicity of cares and duties with which he has to cope as well in Canada, where his business interests lie, as in England, where the responsibilities of the office of high commissioner are his.

Others would appear to have thought of the title "Glencoe," but his lordship never entertained the idea of being known by it.

"Or, as you doubtless know," he said this morning sitting in his beautiful conservatory, which was flooded with a warm light, giving to the deep green of the priceless orchid, a gleam to the oranges, which, in their ripeness, are ready to fall—"as you know, the name Glencoe bears with it certain reminiscences of an unpleasant nature. At the same time Strathcona, who is one of a high feeling to think that he belonged to an empire which could make such a showing. Most of the conception—certainly as far as the colonies or the Greater Britain beyond the sea—was concerned, belonged to Mr. Chamberlain. We have given it to us in that scheme of representation. The distinction with which we were treated is something to remember. The effect will give rise to a greater solidarity between England and this young nation. This will be the general effect with regard to the colonies, but the manner in which Canada was singled out was calculated to touch our pride and patriotism.

When her Majesty ascended the throne, the French-Canadians in this country were in rebellion. Looking back upon the events of that time, we must admit that they had some cause to be angry. The condition of affairs was serious. When we think of this, and reflect that it was a French-Canadian who was selected, not merely by the will of the British, but also of the English people of this aggregation of colonies, we realize the prime minister, the significance of the event is most striking. I can best impress upon you the importance of the event by saying that the subject of the most favorable comment.

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
