TURF. BUMPS BEATS THE RECORD. Louisville, Ky., Sept. 28.—Amid the enthusiastic plaudits of a big crowd at the fair grounds, yesterday, the little brown gelding Bumps, owned by W. K. Billings, of Chicago, broke the world's wagon pacing record of 2:04, held by Joe Patchen. The mile was paced in

2:03 3/4, a second and a half better than the record. The first quarter was paced in 30 seconds flat. Thirty seconds more took him to the half in one minute and he went to the three-quarters pole in 45 seconds. Then the grand stand, wildly excited, rose to its feet, and in 32 1/2 seconds Bumps had passed under the wire in 2:03 3/4 for the mile. The track was fast, but a light wind was blowing. But for this the mark set by Bumps would have been still lower. Bumps is a brown gelding by Baron Wilkes, out of Queen Ethel, she by Strathmore. His record to a sulky is 2:04 1/4. They met for a 20-round go at the Lenox A. C., and McCoy reversed matters in a very thorough manner, winning in the eighth round.
