since been recaptured. The prisoners effected their escape by cutting a fence under the sentry bridge, while the sentry was above. A driver of the sanitary cart was offered \$200 to carry off the prisoners. A big gun had been discovered in the direction opposite to the former one. It has been completed to within five feet of the point for a breach.

MANY FRENCHMEN CAPTURED. Boshof, Orange Free State, Friday, April 6.—The prisoners captured by the British yesterday and brought in today include many Frenchmen. They present a wet and bedraggled appearance. Lord Methuen has complimented his men on their behavior. Capt. Boyle and Williams, of the Yeomanry, and Gen. De Villerois Mauriel were buried today with military honors.

AID FOR BOERS VIA DELAGOA BAY. Pietermaritzburg, April 6.—The correspondent of the Natal Times at Delagoa Bay, who has recently frequently referred to the big gun, has heard of armed recruits which have gone through Delagoa to the Transvaal, having been landed from German and French steamers, says under date of March 26: "A treasury draft from Pretoria for £20,000 was received by a well-known firm here a few days ago. The easy way in which the last lot of big guns was got through to Pretoria, was remarkable. What will the nation say when the truth is known about Delagoa Bay?"

KRUGER DISAPPOINTED. London, April 8.—Speaking at an annexation meeting at Wynberg on April 6, former Premier Sir John Gordon Sprigg declared that he was informed by a member of the Afrikaner Bond, who had just returned from Pretoria, that the executive of the republic expected the active assistance of 45,000 colonials. He had learned also that documents existed incriminating a number of leading colonials in machinations with the governments of the republics.

A REIGN OF TERROR. Lorenzo Marquez, Friday, April 6.—A runner, who has just arrived here from Sobobo's Kraal, Swaziland, says Sobobo has been killed and his women have been tied up with ropes. Unrest is increasing in Swaziland, which is in a most unsettled state, bordering on a reign of terror, in the absence of "white man's law." Many natives have been threatened, and in one district they are being completely killed off. A messenger from Bromersdorp, Swaziland, says the Boers are making presents to the queen and are seeking permission to pass through Swaziland armed. M'Quezie, the famous old Swazi chief, and two women of his household, with their infants, have all been assassinated by M'Quezie's Kraal. The kraal was captured, burned, and the chief's son captured. The kraal's hands are marching about natives and Swazis and marauding in every direction. This correspondent found M'Quezie's son in charge of two natives, who admitted the killing of the chief, but said they had followed the orders of the Swazi queen.

ROYAL IRISH RIFLES. Bloemfontein, Thursday, April 6.—Delayed in transmission.—The Royal Irish Rifles had been marching in the eastern part of the Free State, collecting arms, and were returning to Bloemfontein on Tuesday, when they were intercepted by a Boer commando, which had placed three guns in position. The Irish entrenched themselves, while the mounted infantry scouted along both flanks, only to find escape impossible. The Boers opened with gun and rifle fire. The British replied sparingly, with rifle fire, hussar's hand, with ridges in the hope that help would arrive. Gradually the Boers drew into closer quarters. They fired intermittently during Tuesday night, but did not attempt to rush the British position until Wednesday, when the Irishmen, who had fought tenaciously, were suffering severely from want of food and water. At this time also the rifles had expended their last cartridge. Finding that there was no sign of succor, they surrendered, having fought for nearly 30 hours. They lost ten killed and many wounded. Among the captured is Capt. Tennant, Gen. Gatacre's chief intelligence officer.

ALWAL NORTH, SATURDAY, APRIL 7. The Royal Irish Rifles, which have been falling back from Rouxville, arrived here safely last night. Their retreat was covered by a detachment. (Continued on page 5.)

In Natal.

London, April 8.—It is reported from Ladysmith that the Boers are beginning to construe Gen. Buller's inactivity as a sign of fear or inability to resume active operations. Hence they are showing much activity, particularly around Biggarsburg, and are said to be planning to outflank Gen. Buller by an advance in force by way of Helpmakaar. As the plan is known, it is not likely that the Boers will find Buller unprepared.
 London, April 8.—4:50 a.m.—The Boers are displaying increased activity in Natal, but there is no sign that Gen. Buller is moving.
 THE ARMCHAIR CRITICS.
 The afternoon newspapers are unsparing in their criticisms of the military dispositions permitting 500 men to be isolated and captured. The "St. James' Gazette" and "Globe" dwell with sneering emphasis on "the unfortunate occurrence." "In England," says the "St. James' Gazette," "we can but sit still and wonder what will next happen."

CASUALTIES AT PETERSFONTEIN. The war office has posted the list of casualties at Petersfontein, near Boshof, on April 5. Only one is reported killed, Sergt. Patrick Campbell, of the Imperial Yeomanry, husband of the well-known actress. Nine non-commissioned officers and men are reported wounded.

NO CAUSE FOR ANXIETY. The Bloemfontein correspondent of the Morning Post, telegraphing on Friday, says: "No anxiety need be felt as to the security of Bloemfontein, although the enemy may succeed in destroying telegraphic communication, and even in cutting the railway for a brief period. A number of civilians, including Lady Bertinck and Lady Edward Cecil, who arrived here recently from Cape Town, left today in compliance with a general order issued by the authorities."

THE WATERWORKS AFFAIR. Pretoria, Wednesday, April 4.—It is officially announced here that at the Bloemfontein waterworks the republican forces captured eleven officers and 362 men, with eleven guns, two ammunition wagons, other wagons and mules.

PROBABLY THE SAME AFFAIR. Pretoria, Friday, April 6.—It is reported that Gen. Dewett attacked and defeated a large force of British cavalry of Dewett's Corps, southeast of Bloemfontein, capturing 450 prisoners and a large quantity of ammunition and camp stores, and inflicting heavy loss. The federal loss is stated to be two killed and four wounded. All is quiet with the other commands.

STEYN HOPEFUL. Lorenzo Marquez, Friday, April 6.—President Steyn, in his address to the Free State Volksraad at Kroonstadt, on Wednesday, April 4, said the burghers were in a better position than at the commencement of hostilities. He threatened those who had surrendered to the British and announced that the Free State had borrowed half a million from the Transvaal for the purpose of war. Referring to the correspondence with Lord Salisbury, he observed: "The destiny of the republic is in higher hands than those of the British Government, namely, in the hands of the people of France, Russia and Germany, who are agitating for intervention. The war will soon end. If it be true that Boer prisoners have been sent to St. Helena, we would be justified in consigning British prisoners to the lowest depths of the Johannesburg mines."

6,000 BOERS AT KROONSTADT. The Boers state that the Colesberg and Stormberg commands, numbering 6,000 men and ten guns, have reached Kroonstadt.

A Boer account of the Bloemfontein waterworks affair says: "Col. Broadwood evacuated Thaba Nchu owing to the advance of Commandant Olivier from the south. The federal troops found the British camp in peaceful slumber. Gen. Dewett immediately placed guns and the commands in such positions as to surround the British who did not have time to recover from their surprise."

Boers Prisoners.

CAPTURED BY COLONIALS. Alwal North, Cape Colony, Friday, April 6.—The colonial division at Wepener has captured five prisoners and 400 rifles. The Royal Irish Rifles are falling back on Beestekraal, from Rouxville. The Boers are reported to be moving east and west of Rouxville, and a number of them are reported sixteen miles down the Orange River. A town guard is being formed here. 21 GOT AWAY.
 Simons Town, Cape Colony, Saturday, April 7.—It now appears that fewer than 30 Boers escaped from the old camp last evening. Nine have
