GATHERED UP IN A BASKET.

Three Indiana Miners Blown to Fragments.
BRADFORD, Ind., May 3.—News of a horrible accident near El River Station, south of here, reached this city this evening. Three men, one named Mace, another Johnson and the other unknown, had been sinking a small coal shaft. About 9 o'clock this morning the men were at work in their blacksmith shop, when a piece of red-hot iron flew into a box containing 50 sticks of dynamite. Instantly there was an explosion, and the shop and shaft house were wrecked and the three men blown to pieces. Their remains were gathered up in a basket.

DIED IN A DENTIST'S CHAIR.

A Buffalo Woman Could Not Be Restored After Inhaling Chloroform.
BUFFALO, May 3.—Mrs. Elizabeth Lipp, a handsome young woman of Clinton street, died in a dentist's chair Saturday night while under the influence of laughing gas. Accompanied by her husband, she went to the office of Dr. E. C. Longnecker early in the evening to have four teeth extracted. The dentist advised the use of gas, and Mrs. Lipp consented. She did not yield readily to its influence, and the usual dose was increased. She immediately fell into an unconscious state. After three teeth had been extracted the husband grew frightened at the appearance of his wife. Her face had become pallid, her breathing was light and no pulse could be found.

"My God, she's dead!" cried the husband as he seized her hands and covered them with kisses.

The dentist assured him that she was all right, and then drew the fourth tooth. When he endeavored to restore the woman to consciousness he was horrified to find that every effort failed. Her husband hurried for a physician, but just as the doctor cupped the rails of the railroad for three miles, and on being crushed by the trains the rails became so slippery that it was necessary for the train hands to clear off rails and sand them before the trains could proceed.

DAIRY DOINGS.

Winter Work Done at the Dominion Dairy Station in London.

The following is a report of the work done at the Dominion Dairy Station, London, during the past winter. The station was in operation five months and a half. Two students attended the station during the winter. All the butter was sold in London except 100 pounds. Twenty-two patrons in all sent milk to the station. Fifteen was the highest number sending at any one time, and five the lowest at any one time. Following are the figures:

TO CUT OFF LICENSES.

NIAGARA LIQUOR-DEALERS DOING BUSINESS on the Basis of a Bogus Census.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., May 3.—In August, 1883, a census of this town was taken while a great excursion party was here which gave a population of 5,336, being about 2,000 more than the actual number of inhabitants. This gave the town several liquor licenses more than would be legally allowed upon a bona fide census. The town has prospered since that time, but the last Dominion census report necessitates a reduction of three licenses from the number now issued. Last week a deputation from the town waited upon the members of the Government at Toronto with the view of procuring special legislation to allow the three extra licenses to be continued. This aroused the indignation of the temperance people, and the effort was strongly condemned in the Methodist and Presbyterian churches on Sunday. An indignation meeting was called, when the people expressed their opinion of this effort by speeches and resolutions. A deputation consisting of Rev. Messrs. J. A. Crawford, T. A. Moore, and J. B. Brown, and Mr. W. Wilkinson was appointed to present this feeling of the temperance people to Sir Oliver Mowat to-morrow.
