The New York Canadian Pacific Railway got its charter from the Legislature under the title of the Northern New York Railroad. An extension of the charter was secured, and efforts were put forth from time to time to keep the project alive; but now, since Dr. Webb's St. Lawrence and Adirondack road has been built, it is regarded as extremely doubtful whether any other big company would care to build through the woods, as there is hardly business enough to make it profitable.

The statement that the company will ever develop a railroad which will be a rival to the New York Central is declared to be highly improbable by railroad men.
