HAD ROBERTSON TWO WIVES? TORONTO WOMAN SAYS HE HAD

Came From Toronto With Her Two Children and It Is Alleged Made Startling Statements.

A SEQUEL TO THE BOILER EXPLOSION AT NEWBURY

When a London Fireman on the Grand Trunk Railway Was somewhat unusual course adopted on there, he presumed, because Mr. Fos-Killed-Legal Tangle Is Likely To Result-Case Laid Before Local Lawyers.

Did Fireman John Robertson, of London, who was killed in a boiler explosion on the Grand Trunk Railroad on the 30th of October, live double life?

A tall, handsome woman, in black, calling herself his legitimate wife, it is alleged, claims that he did. The woman calling herself Mrs. Robertson, came to this city from To-

ronto several days ago, and has since, it is said, but without apparent success, endeavored to interest local lawyers in her behalf.

It is alleged that this woman claims to have been married to Robertson a number of years ago, and to have had two children by him. The story goes on to say that Robertson made a custom of stopping

The excuses he is alleged to have made to his wife in this city, whose unfortunate death shortly after that of her husband will be recalled, were, that he was attending to business for his union in Toronto.

APPARENTLY A HAPPY COUPLE. The Robertsons lived at 424 Ontario street, and were apparently as hap-

py a couple as ever lived. On the morning of the 30th of October, Robertson started out on his engine. At Newbury the boiler exploded.

That night he was taken to Victoric Hospital, and never regained e asciousness. He was terribly burned about the body, and but little hope

was held out for his recovery. He died a few hours after the accident. The devotion of the Mrs. Robertson, of London, was pathetic. From the time he first entered the hospital until the moment of his death, she never left his bedside, and her grief was said to have been pitiful.

Her mother, Mrs. Williamson, of Watford, came to London immediately, and strove to comfort her bereaved daughter with but little success. Eventually, however, the daughter seemed to become somewhat reconciled to

DEATH OF MRS. ROBERTSON.

The second terrible affair occurred on a Friday, Nov. 15. Mother and daughter had been eating supper and the daughter arose from the table Retiring to her room, however, she fell to the floor in terrible pain, and

Death was at first said to have been due from ptomaine, but the fact remained that the mother was not ill as a result of having eaten from the same can. The coroner was very reticent regarding the matter.

LOCAL LAWYER APPROACHED.

A well-known local lawyer, who has been approached by the woman from Toronto, who claims to be Mr. Robertson's first wife, stated today that he did not think her claim for damages against the G. T. R. would hold good in a court of law for the reason that to all appearances Robertson had not been supporting her, even admitting that her claims were what she represented them to be.

People who knew the late Mr. Robertson say that he was apparently the most devoted of husbands, and they scout the story of the Toronto

However, she still persists that she is the legal widow of the deceased, and approached another local attorney this morning. It is not known whether he will take up the matter or not.

A PECULIAR CASE.

It is argued now that if a marriage ceremony was ever gone through between the Toronto woman and the late John Robertson, even though performed after the marriage with the Watford lady, the death of the latter now establishes the right of the Toronto woman.

It is said that Robertson only carried about \$240 insurance, but that the alleged Toronto widow thinks she can make the Grand Trunk Railway provide for the maintenance of herself and her two children.
