

MR. JUDD WANTS TO PRACTICE LAW IF APPOINTED POLICE MAGISTRATE

It Is Said He Will Not Accept the Position Unless Permitted to
Do So—Mayor Beattie and Mr. Hume B. Elliott
Are Next in Line.

It is now rumored that Mr. J. C. Judd, K. C., will not accept the position of police magistrate unless he be allowed to practice his profession outside the police court.

The law states that this cannot be done.

The salary in connection with the position of police magistrate is now \$2,000 a year, and this, it is claimed, will not compensate Mr. Judd for sacrificing his law business for a position on the bench.

Failing the appointment of Mr. Judd, it is claimed that Mayor Beattie stands the best chance for the position.

Mayor Would Accept. "I would accept the position," he declared. "I have heard the rumors relative to the appointment of others but nothing official has been given out. It is for Sir James Whitney and the cabinet to say who will get it.

Strong pressure is being brought to bear on behalf of Mr. James B. Elliot. It is said that several very influential business executives have urged his appointment. Mr. Whitney, however, and his friends claim that he stands an excellent chance for the place.

It is between the three men mentioned above. If Mr. Judd refuses on account of the fact that he cannot practice law, then the contest will be a battle between Mayor Beattie and Mr. Elliot.

If his worship is named he would not be compelled to resign his position as mayor of the city.

Under existing conditions he probably would be urged to remain in his present position.

As a matter of fact his worship has a strong pull. That he is an applicant for the place is not denied.

He acknowledged the fact to The Advertiser today, and stated that he was now "up" to Sir James Whitney.
