POOLS FOR BOYS IN THE RIVER

Board of Works Will Go Ahead With Two Swimming Places at Once.

PAVING STANLEY STREET

People Object, and So Do the Street Railway-Meeting of the Board of Works.

At the meeting of the board of works on Thursday night Engineer Wright was instructed to prepare plans for two swimming pools in the river for the boys of the city. The pools, it is expected, will be situated in the north an extended illness, at her home in Hyde and south branches, and will be roped off and a competent supervisor will be put in charge of each.

The committee thought that the grant of \$500, sanctioned by the council, would fully cover the cost of erecting a shelter of the knock-down type; the salaries of the supervisors, which will be about \$12 per week for eight weeks, and the cost of the ropes Everything will be constructed so that it can be stored away during the winter, and erected quickly each spring. A letter was read from Mr. Geo. S. Gibbons, president of the London Playgrounds and Recreative Association, in which he heartily concurred with the decision of the committee that the swimming baths should be under the supervision of the municipal authori-

Paving Stanley Street. The committee referred the question of paving Stanley street back to the council. A petition signed by a large number of the ratepayers was received asking that the pavement be not laid, as the street was not a main thorough-fare, and would be made such by the laying of a pavement. Manager C. B. King, of the street railway, stated that the company was not prepared for the installation of new rails, which would be necessitated if a pavement was laid.

A complaint was received through Messrs. Jarvis & Vining from certain citizens of Trafalgar street, stating that the McClary Manufacturing Company, by extending a railroad siding, had encroached upon the street. Legal action was threatened if the street was tion. The matter was referred to City


