Secondly, fall hardy, such as turnips parsnips, cabbage, parsley.
Third, semi-hardy, which will stand five or six degrees of frost. These

Construction of City's Improvements Gives Work to More Than 500.

FINISHING NEW BRIDGE

Last Pier of Wharncliffe Road Structure Will Be Put in Immediately.

Local improvement work in the city s well under way, and within the next few weeks, it is estimated that more than 500 men will be given employment on various kinds of construction. The city engineer's department which has the contract for considerable sanitary sewer construction, and private contractors, who will build sewers, sidewalks and pavements, are now getting their gangs to gether and some work has already been commenced.

The engineer's department is putting in curbs and gutters on larence street.

City employees are also engaged in the construction of an urgently-needed sewer on Kent street, and another is to be put in at once on Simcoe street.

The Fielder Construction Company has commenced the sanitary sewer
