VEGETABLES TO PLANT

Some Suggestions as to the Proper Varieties for Garden.

"Citizens are growing their own vegetables more and more each year," said a local seedsman. "Saturday was our first busy day and we did a record business."

Inquiry at other seed houses elicited the same reply. It is surprising the number of citizens that have a small garden in their yards. Vegetables are a heavy eating crop and need large quantities of fertilizers if the desired growth is to be obtained. Barnyard manure contains an excessive amount of nitrogen and is valuable in that it keeps the soil open and porous. Commercial fertilizers are within the reach of all and easy to handle. They are easily broken up and the plant find them easy to assimilate.

Before planting, see that the ground is in a good state of tilth. This is most important.

Four Distinct Divisions.

Vegetables are divided into four sections as to frost. First, those that will stand frost in the spring, such as cabbages, cauliflowers, radishes, early turnips, lettuce and spinach.

Secondly, fall hardy, such as turnips, parsnips, cabbage, parsley.

Third, semi-hardy, which will stand five or six degrees of frost. These

are wrinkled peas, beets, cauliflower and celery.

Fourth, tender to frost which includes beans, corn, tomatoes, potatoes, cucumbers, squash, citrons, melons, pumpkins, eggplant and peppers.

Recommended Varieties.

Varieties that are recommended by the Vegetable Gardening Department of the O. A. C. are:—Crosby's early Egyptian, is the best of the early varieties. Detroit red, globe shaped and excellent in all respects and a heavy cropper.

Beans—Keeney's rustler, a stringless bean. Forehook gives best result among the lima beans and cranberry is the best all around among the pole beans.

Chautauky is the best all around carrot, but should be thinned for best results.

Cabbage—Early Jersey Wakefield is the best of the earlier cabbages, while Gloria is the best for your main crop.

Cauliflower—Early snow ball celery, golden self Blanchet.

Corn—Early malakoff and golden bantam.

Citron—Colorado preserving.

Cucumbers—Cumberland, three to five inches long. For pickling, Chicago Westernfield.

Eggplant—Black beauty.

Lettuce—New York, Iceberg Hanson, Munch melon—Rocky ford.

Onions—Southport yellow globe. Sow about twelve inches apart and not very thick.

Parsnips—Hollow crown.

Peas—Suttons excelsior and Stratagem.

THREE "R's" TO BE TAUGHT IN BIG TENT

School Kiddies Will Enjoy Novel Experience When Lesson Start Under Greenwood.

Fifty or more East London kiddies will enjoy the novel experience next week of attending school held in a 40 by 20-foot tent. A. E. Cook and others submitted a petition to the board of education yesterday asking for school accommodation, their children having been sent home from Quebec Street School because of the overcrowding there. One teacher stated that there were 63 pupils in her room. If the board would not do anything else Mr. Cook offered to build a school or a building suitable for temporary use as a school, and rent it to the board for a nominal rental.

L. H. Martyn wanted to build another school like the Empress avenue annex. Dr. Teasdale thought one such school was enough. It was unique and it would be too bad to duplicate it. A. M. Hunt strongly opposed the tent proposition, but Dr. Teasdale, Dr. Shaw and Inspector Edwards were in favor of it.

The tent will cost only \$100, and will be ready for use on Monday next. Mr. Cook said the residents of the district would be satisfied with the tent accommodation for the summer, providing there was permanent accommodation by next fall.

LICENSES ALL RENEWED

East Middlesex Hotels Get Year's Renewal of Liquor Privileges.

East Middlesex license commissioners yesterday afternoon met in St. George's Hall and renewed the five hotel licenses in East Middlesex, held by Hiram Shaw, Hyde Park; B. Cunningham, Ilford; Hugh Bowman, Denfield; Elias D. Blake, Elginfield, and M. Larsen, Arva.

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PUBLIC WORKS ARE WELL UNDER WAY

Construction of City's Improvements Gives Work to More Than 500.

FINISHING NEW BRIDGE

Last Pier of Wharfedale Road Structure Will Be Put in Immediately.

Local improvement work in the city is well under way, and within the next few weeks, it is estimated that more than 500 men will be given employment on various kinds of construction. The city engineer's department which has the contract for considerable sanitary sewer construction, and private contractors, who will build sewers, sidewalks and pavements, are now getting their gangs together and some work has already been commenced.

The Harding Construction Company has a number of men at work finishing a contract on Oxford street, east of Adelaide, which was not reached last fall, and Foley & Gleason, the Ottawa contractors, who have the paving jobs, are grading York street in preparation for the laying of concrete. The engineer's department is putting in curbs and gutters on Clarence street.

City employees are also engaged in the construction of an urgently-needed sewer on Kent street, and another is to be put in at once on Simcoe street.

The Fielder Construction Company has commenced the sanitary sewer work on Haleside street, and another is to be put in at once on Simcoe street.

The last pier of the new Wharfedale bridge will be put in immediately, the engineer advised this morning, after which the remainder of the steel superstructure will be placed in position, ready for the cement flooring. It is expected that the bridge will be open for traffic at the end of the summer.

AFTER 400 MEMBERS

EGG BUYERS ACTIVE

Produce Men Are Scouring Country For Hen Fruits—Prices High.

Strong activity characterizes the trade in eggs. Notwithstanding the advent of hot weather, dealers are buying fast. Several large produce merchants have collectors in rural districts. This and the fact that many producers are keeping eggs for hatching purposes is mainly responsible for any scarcity on the local market.

Judging from the past week's developments, there is a strong feeling that the demand will prevent lower prices. The present prices are 19 to 22 cents per dozen as compared to 18 and 19 cents per dozen last year.

PASTOR NOT YET CALLED

No Successor Chosen to the Late Dr. Ross of St. Andrew's Church.

No call has yet been extended to any minister to fill the vacant pastorate of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, formerly held by the late Dr. James Ross.

Rev. Thomas H. Mitchell, interim moderator of the session of St. Andrew's Church, stated today that as yet no prospective pastor was under consideration. Instead of inviting ministers to preach in St. Andrew's Church, a committee was appointed early in the winter to hear ministers preaching in their own pulpits, but as yet this committee has not reported.

No Work for Them.

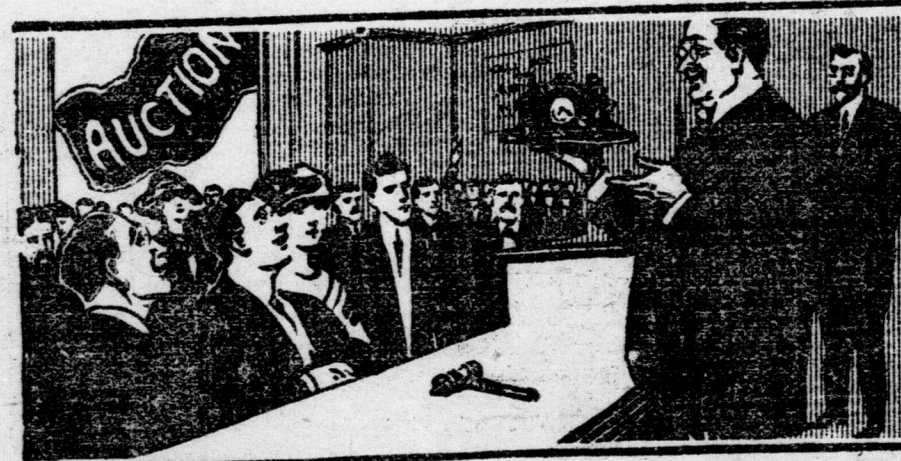
