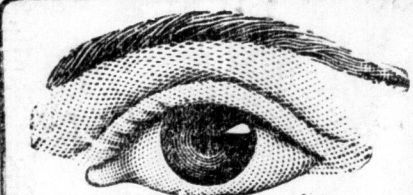

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APPOINT ENGINEER

Expert Will Take Charge of Collegiate Institute Plant.

The Collegiate Institute committee of the board of education yesterday appointed Fred Phillips, engineer of the Helena Costume Company, as engineer in charge of the heating plant of the school.

The chairman, E. R. Dennis, and Principal Rogers were named a committee to secure prices for desks and cabinets for the new classrooms, and library stacks for the new building. The committee will be called for the equipment for the gymnasium.

Mr. Dennis reported that, while considerable progress has been made with the work of renovating the school, and the classrooms were all ready for occupation, the fitting up of the science and domestic science rooms would take another two weeks.

G. N. W. WILL RESUME DEFERRED RATE SERVICE

The Great North Western Telegraph Company announces that commencing October 1st, deferred rate cable service will be resumed with all countries with which it was in effect prior to the commencement of the European war, except that in Europe the service extends for the present only to Great Britain, Gibraltar, Holland and Norway.

In the case of Australia, New Zealand, Tasmania, deferred messages must temporarily be routed via London owing to interruption of the British Pacific cable.

Leaves for England

Newly Commissioned British Officer is en Route to War Zone.

A. H. Burton, who, until granted his discharge on Monday from the R.C.R., was sergeant-instructor in physical training, attached to the local militia headquarters staff, left on the 2:30 P.M. train last night for Quebec, and from there will sail for England on one of the transatlantic carrying members of the Canadian contingent to take a British army commission, which was offered to him last week. The quarter-master-general at Quebec has been instructed by the Minister of Militia to make the necessary transport arrangements.

Every orthodox Jew in London, and all over the world for that matter, today is celebrating the Feast of Yom Kippur, or the Day of Atonement. The day is being spent in prayer at the synagogues, and no food is to be eaten all day, until after sunset. The last previous meal was taken at suppers yesterday.

All the Jewish places of business in the city were closed for the day, and the 500 Jews in London observed the occasion rigorously. The services in the synagogues were most impressive, the people being exhorted to improve their moral conduct and to discontinue all wickedness. The day is the holiest in the whole of the Jewish calendar.

Next week the Feast of Tabernacles will be observed. This is a time of general feasting among the Jews, and is a general Jewish holiday.

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LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED FOR 1915

City Engineer Mapping Out the Work To Be Undertaken Next Year.

City Engineer W. N. Ashplant is at work upon a comprehensive scheme for continuing local improvements next year. The plan provides for \$500,000 in public work was laid out this year, most of it being completed, was prepared by him last year. The cost of storm and sanitary sewers alone this year will be about \$300,000.

Ther plan for next year will be submitted to the next council for approval. Much of the work which will be incorporated in this year's work has been petitioned already filed with the department. City Engineer Ashplant is advising many residents who complain of being neglected in this respect, that their petitions as soon as possible. These petitions for public works will be taken up in the order of their filing. The work planned will cost equally as much as this year's expenditures.

Who Put the Age In City Garbage

Aldermen Say the Credit Belonging to Them is Taken by Others.

Who started the garbage investigation? Now that the collection of garbage is being done under municipal ownership, another question has been brought up about it. Aldermen who started in as early as May to present information to the council as to the necessity of adopting municipal ownership feel that they have won a victory over the board of control and its chairman. For several months the board opposed the adoption of municipal ownership in garbage matters. Now the aldermen hear that the board favored municipal ownership from the start. While the board and the aldermen are respectively taking credit for the change, persons outside the city hall publicly claim a victory for themselves as having inspired the fight.

"What's the good of being an alderman?" said one of these officials today. "When you try to do something somebody steals the credit."

SAUEL S. CASEY DEAD

Well-Known Londoner Came of U. E. L. Stock.

Samuel Selden Casey, a well-known Londoner, died yesterday at his residence, 84, Hallmark avenue. He was born near Belleville in March, 1844. He was a descendant of United Empire Loyalist stock. In 1868 the firm of his ancestors in America landed in New England from England, and were of the Puritan faith.

He received his education at Albert College, Belleville, and for some time taught school in Hastings County. In 1869 he married Ida Kent, daughter of the late Albert Kent, of Belleville. In 1877 he moved to Westminster Town, in Middlesex County, where he resided till 1887, when he moved to the city of London, where, with the exception of a few years spent in Western Canada, he had since lived.

He is survived by his wife and one son, Avery, who is practicing law in the firm of Balfour, Martin & Casey, at Regina, Sask.

LEAVES FOR ENGLAND

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BRITAIN JUSTIFIED IN PRESENT STAND

Western "U" President Declares She Did Utmost To Maintain Peace.

Professor E. E. Braithwaite, president of the Western University, interviewed last night by The Advertiser, expressed his view of the war in Europe in the following terms:

"War seems the most senseless method of settling difficulties between nations. The result can prove nothing as to the merits of the victors' cause. At the best it can but establish which is the stronger antagonist. But however much one may oppose principles, war is a necessary evil."

Britain is justified. "In the present conflict Britain's domestic negotiations show beyond doubt how strenuously her statesmen endeavored to ward off the threatened disaster. When this was impossible she turned the cudgel not in any selfish interest, but for the good of all Europe, and of the whole world. A sacred principle was at stake. As British people we should have had to hang our heads in shame if our leaders had held back at such a crisis simply through desire to avoid the great loss of life and property that was sure to be the result if the nation failed to stand in honor now to stop before the desired end is gained."

"The sacrifice is enormous; the horrors of the conflict are dreadful, but as some compensation for the great price that is being paid there must be no cessation of hostilities until it is settled once for all that no nation can hereafter plunge the world into such an uproar as Germany has succeeded in producing."

Germany Has Already Lost. "One point which I have not seen much emphasized in that Germany has already lost. She has lost far more seriously than any defeat of her arms. The last time she won a victory she was nearly at the summit. In culture, in scientific investigation, in industrial progress, she was almost unsurpassed. Today she stands for the defilement of brute force and military despotism. It will be many generations at the best before she can regain her former position. Whatever may be the immediate outcome of the war this is one of the saddest considerations, that the discipline of the world is being lost, and from which so much might have been expected in the interests of humanity should lend itself to such a selfish and unworthy purpose."

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

MILITARY OBEDIENCE. The wholesale and remorseless slaughter going on in Europe under the name of war is furnishing many an observant thinker. One of these lessons has an application near home. It will be recalled that when the extension of military training in this country was being discussed, a couple of years ago some wiseacres favored the militarizing of the exercises, giving as their reason that military obedience is a good kind of obedience to stamp into children. It is supposed to produce the habit of prompt response to command—unquestioning and unreasoning. In Tennyson's words:

"Their's not to make reply—
Their's not to reason why—
Their's but to do and die."

History affords no other equally striking example of the effects of this kind of training upon a nation at large than is exhibited by Germany at the present time. It is an irreparable vindication of the Rev. Mr. Inkster's contention that militarism should be kept out of the schools. The case against militarizing education can hardly be stated more clearly than was done in a recent issue of the Canadian Youth.

It says: "Everyone is now talking of the crime of Germany; and we are wondering how far the Germans as a people are so firmly stamped with obedience to their rulers. The Germans are obedient; but obedience is a spiritual virtue only if you still keep a will beyond their will to obey. The power, is that there is no will in it beyond the will to obey. It is well to be angry over the crime of Germany, but in our anger we must still try to understand the causes of that crime. The German by himself is not a brutal man; he is a human being, with instincts that have the will to assert themselves. All the best of him is converted into obedience, and it will obey anyone who commands, whatever the command may be."

The Times hardly needs to argue—it is so potent—that militaristic obedience has been so firmly stamped upon every youth graduated through the German system, that in the hand of his superior he ceases to be a man and becomes a mere marionette—when commanded to do anything he does it, no more responsibility for his deeds than does the weapon he carries in his hands. It is in spite of, and not on account of, his training.

RUSSIANS MARCH TO GREAT BATTLE

Will Soon Meet Germans and Austrians in Extended Line.

[Canadian Press.]
LONDON, Sept. 29.—Having invested Przemyśl, the Russians are reported to be making their way not only through the Carpathians to the east but also through the Carpathians to the west, in strength, toward Cracow, which they should reach before the week is out unless the Austrian field army should succeed in checking the advance. Their arrival at Cracow would be the sign for a battle along the Russian-German frontier.

The Germans are in force at Cracow, where the Austrians would form their extreme right, and have considerably reinforced their front extending north of that fortress through Kalisz, Russian Poland, to a point in the province of West Prussia. Further north, they have got as far as the Russian-Niemen, in East Prussia, where they are reported to have suffered reverses. The two armies, however, are in close touch right across the country, so that a battle along this extended front cannot be long delayed.

The Russian Emperor's immense armies will oppose the Germans at every point, and will themselves try to invade Germany in more than one district.

Servians Prepare For Attack. Of the operations around Sarajevo nothing has been heard today, but the Servians and Montenegrins must soon be ready for a grand assault on that city, which, beyond all others, the Servians would like to occupy.

The Austrians are also being attacked at Cattaro, where in addition to land operations by the Montenegrins, the French and English fleets are making an effort to reduce the fortress.

There is more talk of Italy, Rumania and Turkey becoming involved in the war, but for the moment Italy is being held back by the Government. Turkey, it is believed, would like to take a hand, in the hope of recovering some of the territory she lost in the Balkan wars, but the moment she does, Germany would be in arms against her, while this would also be the signal for Rumania to come in.

ITALIANS ANSWERING CALL FOR RECRUITS
