TWO AGED MEN LIKELY KILLED BY MAD WOMAN

Port Huron Girl, Intimating Murder, Asks That Mother Be Guarded.

Mrs. Sullivan Made Six Attempts To End Her Own Life.

Port Huron, July 10.—After having made six unsuccessful attempts to end her life during the past week and having endeavored once to burn the dwelling in which she and the surviving members of her family reside, Johannah Sullivan, aged 63 years, sister of Michael Sullivan, and widow of James Sullivan, both of whom died under suspicious circumstances at their home in Emmett Township, is being held at the county jail. It was learned by the sheriff and prosecuting attorney today that since the death of her husband she has been violently insane at times and has been restrained only by the combined efforts of all members of the family.

Tried to Suicide. Six times Mrs. Sullivan has attempted to end her life, according to stories told to the county officers this afternoon by Marlon and Margaret Sullivan, daughters, both of whom are teachers in rural schools. Once she swallowed insect powder, still another time she swallowed a sidecomb two inches long and four inches wide, and on other occasions she attempted to die by choking herself with a towel, handkerchief and cord.

A few mornings ago, Marlon, the eldest daughter, was awakened at 4 o'clock by the fumes of smoke. In the kitchen she found flames leaping up from the woodbox, and she called out, partially clothed, sitting near by. Mrs. Sullivan was the only member of the family awake at that time, and she did not deny that she attempted to burn the dwelling, though she could give no cause.

Found Strychnine. A partially emptied vial of strychnine was found today in the house. It was Mrs. Sullivan who had prepared the means for both of the deceased men a few minutes before their deaths. The daughters now intimate a belief that their mother, while laboring under a belief that injury would come to her, placed the fatal drug in the food of the farmers.

It now appears doubtful that any criminal action will be taken against Mrs. Sullivan. If she is insane and her conduct indicates that she is not feigning a mental weakness—she cannot, according to Michigan laws, be held for a criminal offence. This afternoon an application for her commitment to an asylum was filed in probate court by her daughter Marlon. In all probability she will be sent to the Pontiac institution or to the one for the criminal insane at Ionia. A committee of physicians has been appointed by Judge Hart, of the probate court, to examine her condition. A report of this body is expected before noon tomorrow. At 1:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon she will be given a hearing in probate court.

Lost Her Memory. Mrs. Sullivan now appears to have lost mind completely. She declares she has no memory of the past at all. She said that she missed her brother and husband from the house, but had no idea when they died or what caused their deaths. All power of reasoning apparently has been lost since the deaths of the two men. She displayed no feeling at all when placed in custody of Sheriff Malmes, and rambled incoherently all the time she was being driven from Emmett to Port Huron.

The woman formerly was an inmate of a Dearborn retreat. She was committed to that institution in 1885 and remained there a few weeks. According to her daughters her mentality never has been right since that time. At times she would be seized with a violent fit and would surrender only to be restrained by force. For several months she had been rational and able to discharge her ordinary duties, the daughters state, but from the date of the death of her husband she has been most violent.

HIGH CONSTABLE FINDS STOLEN HORSE AND RIG

Arrest of a Young Man and Woman Likely To Be Made.

The horse belonging to the Messrs. Mitchell, of Lambeth, was recovered, this morning, by High Constable Gumb, after having been taken care of for a night by a resident of West London.

The horse was stolen from the sheds at Springbank Park on Wednesday night and driven to the Aged People's Home in the north end of the city. Mr. Gumb was notified that the horse was seen in West London, it having pulled away from the place where it was tied after standing for a greater part of the night.

The horse was taken in by a man in West London, and given good care until the high constable had traced it. It was a valuable animal, and fortunately was not injured during its absence from home.

A man and a young woman are suspected of having taken the horse from the sheds, and it is likely that arrests will be made.

Took Doctor's Shoes Left an Old Pair

Fair Exchange Is No Robbery, But This Wasn't Fair.

Fair exchange is no robbery, according to an old-fashioned saw, but according to a Queen's avenue physician it wasn't a fair exchange that yesterday robbed him of his nice new shoes and left in their place a pair of broken down "trampers." The trampers gaped at the toes bulged at tops, ran over at the heels and had air-holes in the soles. The doctor's shoes didn't.

The doctor lay down to sleep yesterday near the door. During his siesta a hoarse-spoken new shoe through the open door, coolly walked in, appropriated them and left the old ones in their place. He also helped himself to a tin of the doctor's tobacco and then departed. What the pill-mixer said when he woke and discovered the loss, sounded like—well, it couldn't very well be printed, at all events.

SENT TO JAIL

Young Winnipeg Woman Pleaded Not Guilty To Killing Child.

[Canadian Press.] Winnipeg, July 11.—Mary McCourt, found guilty of concealment of child-birth, was sentenced to nine months in the provincial jail. The plea of not guilty of murdering her infant was changed with the consent of the crown after the jury had failed to reach an agreement. One juror held out for a verdict of murder, and the others for a verdict of guilty of concealment of child-birth.

PAINFULLY HURT

Harry Parker, of Ingersoll, Was Hurled From Cab.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ingersoll, July 11.—Thrown from his cab yesterday when his horse ran away, Mr. Harry Parker sustained painful injuries. He had called at a passenger's home, and was returning on Thames street north, when a break to his cab, caused the horse to become frightened.

It started to run at a lively clip, and coming in contact with an obstruction, the vehicle was overturned, Mr. Parker falling heavily to the street. His head, face and hands were cut, but unless injured internally his condition is not regarded as serious. He was taken to the hospital, where his wounds were dressed.

POLICE IN LEAGUE WITH BIG GANG OF HOODLUMS

Serious Charges Made Against Montreal Force After a Serious Assault.

Montreal, July 11.—That the city police here are in league with a gang of hoodlums, who on Monday night almost killed John H. Roberts at the close of an open air temperance meeting, is one of the serious charges made by the grand lodge of Quebec, Independent Order of Good Templars, in a letter forwarded today to Sir Lomer Gouin, the provincial premier, who is asked to control the Montreal police force and place it under a competent head.

Mr. Roberts himself, in an interview, says the local police administration "out-Beckers Becker, and values prudence and savor faire more than honor, justice and right."

Mr. Roberts traces the alleged animosity of the administration to him to accusations, denied by the parties concerned, he has lodged that Chief Campbell and other police officials are connected with the Frisco Soda Water Company, whose products hotels and houses of ill-fame buy for "protection."

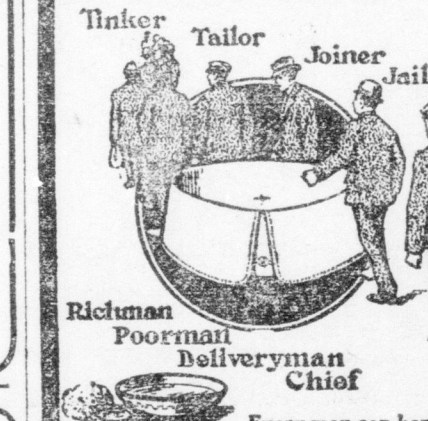
