KITCHENER WOMAN DIES OF INJURIES CAUSED BY AUTO

Mrs. Edward Fehrenbach Hit
by Auto Thursday—An
Inquest Ordered.

KITCHENER, June 17.—Mrs. Edward Fehrenbach, who was struck down by a motor car at the corner of Weber and Queen streets last evening, died at the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital here shortly after 3 o'clock this morning.

Mrs. Fehrenbach was crossing the street with her husband at the time of the accident, when a motor car driven by Mervin Seymour suddenly swerved around the corner from North Queen street, throwing Mrs. Fehrenbach to the curb and ending its career by crashing into a telephone pole. Two small girls were in the car with Mr. Seymour at the time, and they were badly shaken up.

Mr. Seymour rushed to the assistance of Mrs. Fehrenbach, who was promptly taken to the office of Dr. Hagmaler. It was not thought at first that her injuries were serious, but about 9 o'clock she was taken with a vomiting spell and lapsed into unconsciousness. She was then removed to the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital, where she died this morning without regaining consciousness. Mrs. Fehrenbach, who was the mother of Miss Olivia Fehrenbach, who recently graduated from St. Joseph's Hospital, London, Ont., as the valedictorian of her class. Deceased was about 50 years of age, and was a native of Kitchener. Seymour notified the coroner immediately after the accident. An inquest has been ordered by Coroner Kalkbrenner for next Friday.

VALUABLE LIVE STOCK DESTROYED BY STORM

Considerable Damage Done To Standing
Grain By Wind And Rain.

WOODSTOCK, June 17.—During a heavy thunderstorm this morning lightning struck and killed a valuable horse on the farm of Fred Thompson, 13th line, East Zorra. A Holstein cow was also killed in the neighborhood. Rain fell in torrents and did much to help along strawberries, which were beginning to show up. However, the heavy rain and wind did considerable damage to the standing grain crop.

NEW CHURCH AT BRINSLEY

BRINSLEY, June 17.—The laying ceremony of the new Methodist Church in Tuesday, June 14, in the afternoon. The service was conducted by Rev. G. W. W. Rivers, B.A., B.D., of Hensall, chairman of the District Methodist conference. The president of the London conference, Rev. J. W. Hibbert, gave an inspiring address, making reference to the splendid enterprise into which the community had entered so wholeheartedly, and indicative of the place the church held in their lives.

Two stones were laid. A Ladies' Aid stone and a trustee stone by W. G. Mead of Exeter, and S. C. Chown of Lucan. In these stones were placed late editions of the London and Toronto daily papers. The Christian Guardian, the Pioneer, a copy of the Word of God and a Methodist hymn book, several current coins and church documents.

Addresses were given by Rev. W. E. Wilson, J. Agnew, J. H. Lamb, and Rev. C. R. Caraculian, B.A., returned missionary from China, and suitable music was rendered by the choir.

After the ceremony a strawberry tea was served in the church shed, which was splendidly patronized and thoroughly enjoyed.

In the evening a musical entertainment was given by the young people of Centralia, entitled "The Land of Promise." This was under the auspices of the young people of the Guild. The proceeds are to defray the expenses of a memorial window to be placed in the church in memory of the fallen soldiers of the community. A large number attended the concert.

UNSAVORY STORIES AIRED IN TORONTO POLICE COURT PROBE

Two Important Witnesses Are
Absent—Inquiry Postponed
Till Wednesday.

TORONTO, June 17.—Owing to a shortage of complaints received at banks and police headquarters tonight, a store or more Sarnia businessmen have learned that by cashing supposed government checks they have lost some of money which the banks state will run into thousands of dollars.

The procedure followed was for the two men who worked the game to call at some grocery store on the outlying streets of the city and make a small purchase, tendering one of their checks as payment, and taking the change in cash.

The checks were all for sums ranging between \$10 and \$20, large enough to mulct a fair sum of money from the grocer, and not quite large enough to rouse suspicion enough to call the bank. All the checks were made on the Toronto branch of the Mercantile Bank of Canada, rubber stamped across the face "Militia and Defence," with the name and regimental number of the man to whom the check was supposed to have been issued and T. Croford.

The fact that they were supposed to be government checks, and for comparatively small sums, made the work of the crooks very easy.

SHOWERS LENGTHEN STRAWBERRY SEASON

Growers Claim Prices Are Un-
profitable—Five Cents
Does Not Cover Cost.

SIMCOE, June 17.—Today's showers lengthened the strawberry season for another week, according to growers in this county. William Lefter of St. Williams stated to The Advertiser that the crop would have been finished yesterday if showers had not freshened the plants today. Growers are disappointed over the prevailing prices. At the beginning of the season the Dominion Canners offered to buy berries, which are now being sold to the retailers for five cents a box and some growers are going from door to door in an effort to get eight cents a box, as they say five-cent berries are not worth trouble of picking. The cost of new measure boxes demanded by the government and the sudden tumble of profits in those places has made it unprofitable, they say.

Memory Was Bad.

Mrs. Griepstein said she had seen Corley and Markowitz come out of the latter's residence one evening both walking unsteadily as if they were drunk. Questioned by Mr. Wilkie as to their ability to walk, the witness said: "Their feet were too weak to convey their bodies."

R. H. Greer, K.C., counsel for Markowitz, asked that Mrs. Griepstein's husband be called as a witness during the investigation, as he wished evidence given as to a conviction of Griepstein in police court. Griepstein would be subpoenaed, Mr. Geary promised.

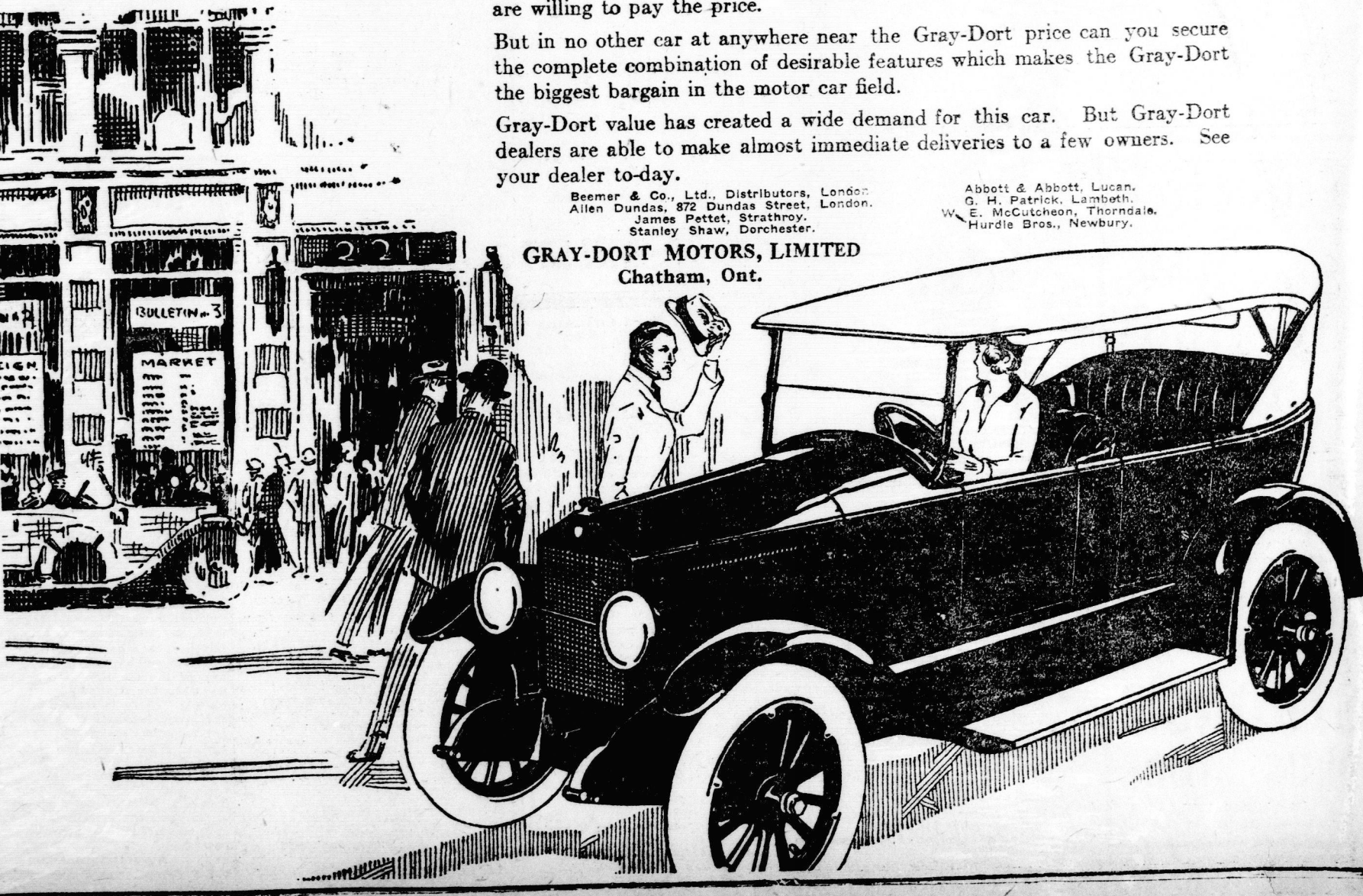
