OUR BANKS SOUND

Good Canadians Urged To Be Sane and "Stop Rocking the Boat."

The Canadian banking system is as sound as any in the world. Those inclined to uneasiness over the Home Bank failure, or who regard with foreboding the industrial and financial situation in Canada, are helping to create a lack of confidence which

conditions do not justify. This, in short, is a summary of the opinions of leading industrial executives in this city. Half a dozen, questioned in connection with the business outlook of Canada, expressed sincere conviction that this country is on the verge of a new prosperity, and that its banking institutions are sounder than any in Europe or the

United States.

Money on deposit in Canadian banks, they declared, was as safe as the country itself. Why the Home Bank failure, which might have occurred in a period of great prosperity, or in any country, should precipitate distrust in Canadian institutions, they could not understand. Only ignorance of the fundamentally strong and vigorous financial system which Canadian banks operate would cause the wholesale transference of deposits from one institu tion to another. This practice, local authorities state, should be discouraged, for it only results in disturbance, and in no way enhances th

I believe Canadian banks are in a general safe and sol-vent state. It is to be deplored that small failure should depress industry and sow seeds of pessimism such pessimism is not justified



It is said this melody was written in half an hour. It made a remarkable impression on his pub-sers, and he received \$25,000 for it, the largest price ever paid for an single composition at that time.

Mr. Berlin is now the head of the greatest popular song publishing con-cern in the world. He and Ted Snyder started business together a decade or so ago, and since then he has amassed a great fortune.

BRITAIN PROHIBITS ENTRY OF VALUABLE SILVER FOXES
