Johnson, realizing that his champion ship aspirations were at stake, set a furious pace from the start. He direct ed a smashing attack to the head and body, and had Brennan in distress in several rounds, notably the 12th and 15th. His eagerness cost him several chances to put over what might have been a decisive blow.

Brennan weathered the storm of his young opponent's attack largely because of bitaries. young opponent's attack largely be-cause of his ring generalship and ap-parent good condition.
