GLOOMY OUTLOOK RULES IN BRITAIN, SAYS DR. TAMBLYN

Declares On Return Spirit of Depression Is Found Everywhere.

BROTHERHOOD MEETS

The traveller returning from England carries with him an impression of utter despondency and hopelessness. Dr. W. P. Tamblin declared before members of the First Methodist Church Brotherhood Sunday morning.

Dr. Tamblin's subject was "Recent Political Opinion in England." He stated that the majority of old countrymen with whom he conversed believed England's prospects were virtually nil, and several expressed the general view when they said "now is a good time to get out of the country."

"There is apparently no grounds for thinking the unemployment problem will be solved for many years," Dr. Tamblin said. "The class of men I discussed the situation with were agreed that England had seen her best days."

Reflects Opinions. The speaker did not offer any opinions of his own, but stressed on his hearers that he was merely reflecting sentiments expressed to him in the course of his visit in England during the summer.

"I was speaking with John Burns, the retired labor leader, who said I had come to England when she was in the 'toughest corner in history.' This prominent union chief could see no immediate solution to the country's manifold problems. He predicted, however, that the people would no longer tolerate the dominance of Foreign Regimes and Aliens, who come down from Oxford to lord it over the common classes."

The result of the British elections vindicated the words of Mr. Burns, Dr. Tamblin said. Many believed Labor would not be very successful in the elections, as millions of Laborites themselves were dissatisfied with the Labor program.

Critique Dole. Complaints were heard everywhere regarding the government's doles. It was said that women could not hire domestic help because of the readiness with which domestic work was secured in lieu of their regular employment. A plan was broached recently in England, in which the system of dole benefits would be taken out of government hands and placed under the supervision of employers and trade union officials.

Dr. Tamblin attended a large convention of the Students' Christian Movement. This organization was formed for the purpose of developing a better feeling among the university students of the world. They paid the cost of several foreign scholars' attendance, and the association was evidently in a strong and influential position.

Summarizing his impressions, Dr. Tamblin said that heavy taxation, unemployment and general discontent was rampant in England. Englishmen realized that their country was paying for the war to a much greater extent than either France or Germany.

ANNEXATION OF FIUME TO ITALY IS REPORTED

HUMANITY ENTERS NEW CIVILIZATION

Unrest and Discontent Have Been Crucial Tests, Says Dr. McGregor.

EXTREMIST VIEWS FAIL

Notwithstanding the unrest and discontent, which has enveloped the world for years, humanity is emerging from the crucial tests of civilization stronger and greater than before.

Rev. D. C. MacGregor, D.D., declared at the Askin Street Church Sunday morning.

Dr. MacGregor's subject was "The Church and the New Age." He spoke of the forces which are trying to undermine the foundations on which civilization has been built, but stated that humanity was not crouching before any authority.

Peoples of all Christian nations were ready and waiting to march boldly forward, he said. The only question was what direction they would take.

"Many desire a return of conditions as they existed in 1914," Dr. MacGregor said. "Others wish for the overthrow of old forms and conditions, to be replaced by a totally new system. In my estimation both are wrong. No thinking man cares for a return to such thought and attitudes which brought about the greatest war of all time. The proper and sensible course is between the two."

The principles upon which the new civilization will be built are threefold," Dr. MacGregor said. "The first is the supremacy of human values. That is, every development on earth must take into consideration the action and methods of the individual. The second is the spirit of brotherhood, which must be emphasized and nourished to further greater contentment and happiness. The third is the necessity of a religion that only in cultivating a fine spiritual conception of things will the right attitude toward life be discovered."

"It is my belief that a new civilization is rapidly being born," Dr. MacGregor concluded. "It is as different from the civilization of 1914 as it will be different from that which the extremists desire. Founded on these three principles it cannot help, but bring great benefits to the world."

HOME DESTROYED BUT BABY SAVED

Mrs. Jane Crosby Faces Flames To Rescue Two-Year-Old Son.

Special to The Advertiser. Windsor, Jan. 13.—Mrs. Jane Crosby, 39 years old, Grand Marais road, Sandwich west, was seriously burned this afternoon while carrying her two-year-old son from her home which was destroyed by fire caused by a gasoline stove exploding.

Mrs. Crosby was in the front room when the blast rocked the frame dwelling. Rushing to her infant son, who was near the kitchen door not far from the stove, she first wrapped the boy in a coat and then carried him out by the back door. She was badly burned on the face and body, but the infant escaped injury except for minor burns on one arm.

The Windsor fire department was called, and for more than an hour pumped from a 30-foot wall. The house was totally destroyed, the damage being estimated at \$3,000.

QUEBEC LIKELY TO ASK INTEREST ON BONDS

Action in the Bank Merger Is Expected To Be Taken Next Week.

Associated Press Despatch. Montreal, Jan. 12.—A Quebec special to the Gazette says: Interest must be paid to the provincial government on the \$15,000,000 of bonds to be issued by the government to aid the merged Banque Nationale and Hochelaga Bank before there is payment of dividends, according to definite information in connection with the measure to be brought before the house next week.

The first charge on the profits of the new bank will be interest on the bonds, or any portion of them, should such bonds be negotiated by the bank to which the government will turn them over.

The second charge will be dividends to the shareholders.

"The third charge will be sinking fund, amounting to \$134,000 per year during the forty-year period."
