## BERLIN WINS AGAIN

### FIRST LEAGUE GAME OF THE SEASON. BERLIN SHOULD GREAT FORM.

The first league game in the Western Ontario Pro. League was played here last night between the old time rivals Berlin and Waterloo, and when the final whistle blew the score read, Berlin 8, Waterloo 3.

That the better conditioned team won there is no doubt, but the locals had their men more on the ice and not so much on the fence the score might have been different.

The game was fast and furious and the checking very heavy. Both teams were doing time for the penalty box. The rough element must be left off the team. Several hands to hand encounters took place and much ill feeling prevailed among the players. Berlin was not backward in handing out their side and many times, sometimes one and two at a time, were doing time for the penalty box.

As to the game it was fast in spots. Berlin's line made swift rushes but Cross in goal played the best game of his career.

The first half was largely in favor of Waterloo, the puck being in the vicinity of the Berlin goal most of the time. Lehma was there with the goods however, and stopped many shots that were dead on. The locals pulled up ahead however, at half time the score reading, Waterloo 2, Berlin 1.

The second half was just as fast as the first, the light forwards of the locals playing a magnificent game. The visitors however, proved too heavy and the boys were gradually worn down. In this half the visitors scored seven times while the best Waterloo could do was one lone tally and the game ended 8 goals to 1.

For Waterloo McLaughlin was easily the best. He played a strong game all through and is a corner. Manson and Dunsome were also there with the goods and Cross in goal did all that was expected of him. Goldie did not play up to his old time form while Howie Young gave matches to his brilliant playing. Cap. McDonald was on for the first time and was inclined to rough it too much.

For Berlin McNamara, Dumart and Lehma were the pick and in fact the whole team will take some beating. Pete Layden of Paris handled the ball and there was no kick coming, his decisions being fair and impartial. The attendance was big, there being nearly 2,000 present.

**Local Improvements Were Feature of Elections in Ontario.**

**Hydro-Electric Policy of the Whitney Government is Issue in Brimpton and Dundas and is Supported by Disqualification of Scores of Civil Servants.**

**Toronto, Jan. 4.**—Voting on sundry bylaws for municipal improvements was a feature of yesterday's municipal elections throughout the province.

The Government's hydro-electric power policy was contested in three places. Brimpton carried bylaws to enter into an agreement for hydro-electric power, but at Ingersoll the \$30,000 bylaw for the establishment of an independent plant for the distribution of Niagara power was defeated. The vote was for 274, against 297.

At Dundas the hydro-power bylaw was carried by 389 majority, and a bylaw to provide a board of commissioners for the perpetual maintenance of the Corby Public Library carried by 264.

St. Catharines refused to vote \$15,000 toward a new hospital.

Pergus and Thorntown will have public libraries.

Kingston carried bylaws to purchase a fire engine and extend streets. At Ottawa, four bylaws carried. One is to create a public department; another to provide a garbage incinerator; a third to improve the city hall, and a fourth to give the Metropolitan Power Co. the right to sell power in the city. This is the old company whose franchise is being renewed for sale of power only.

At Owen Sound the public library bylaw to build a new library, a bylaw to build a new wing to the general hospital and the bylaw to put the parks under commissioners, were carried, while the bylaw to spend \$700 on the old town hall was defeated.

At Peterboro a bylaw to grant a franchise to the Peterboro Light & Power Co. carried.

**Hamilton.**

Hamilton, Jan. 4.—The results of the municipal elections, yesterday, placed two hydro men out of four on the board of control, and eight straight hydro aldermen out of 21. Politically the council is divided into 15 Conservatives, six Liberals. Had it not been for the license reduction agitation and the great number of hydro candidates, amongst whom the vote was split up, the hydro would have won a clean sweep. This is the order in which the board of control candidates ran: Bailey 4,388, Cooper 4,185, Gidner 3,699, and 3,699.

Kingston, Jan. 4.—Mayor Daniel Cooper was re-elected by acclamation, and there being contests in only five wards, the election passed off very quietly. In Spadina ward, Ald. Dr. Hanley defeated Dr. Richardson; Ontario ward, T. W. Harrison defeated W. J. Fair; St. Lawrence ward, Ald. D. A. Givens defeated O. H. Chown; Alderman defeated O. H. Chown; George Smith; Victoria ward, S. F. Bailey defeated J. W. Linton. The Social and Reform League, recently organized, had three candidates, Chown, Linton and Armstrong, and Armstrong was elected. The league is fighting for a reduction of licenses, and has a council elected down the street for a referendum. Aldermen elected by acclamation are Ald. F. J. Hoag, Frontenac ward, and Dr. McCarthy, St. Catharines.

**St. Catharines.**

St. Catharines, Jan. 4.—Five new faces will be seen in next year's city council, namely J. D. Chaplin, St. Andrew's ward; A. Shewell, St. George's ward; Robert Black, George E. Jones and James A. Wiley, St. Patrick's. Aldermen James Mainland, McBride and James T. Petrie retired to politics and the council elected down the street for a referendum. Aldermen elected by acclamation are Ald. F. J. Hoag, Frontenac ward, and Dr. McCarthy, St. Catharines.

**Belleville.**

Belleville, Jan. 4.—The only contest for aldermen and school trustees was in Murray ward, John Canning, A. G. Vermilyea, William Woolley and Joshua Lang for aldermen, three to be elected, and Lang was defeated. For school trustees, J. L. Tickell beat A. L. Green by 33 votes.

**Windsor.**

Windsor, Jan. 4.—J. W. Hanna, lawyer, Benwell headed the polls for aldermanic honors. The aldermen are: J. W. Hanna, D. H. Bedford, N. J. Clinton, A. H. Dalziel, T. J. Elmer, F. L. Howell, P. M. Kemp, H. J. McKay, J. R. Sheppard, H. Trumble, J. J. Jones, Thomas Porter, John Martin, Water commission, J. E. Smyth.

**Peterboro.**

Peterboro, Jan. 4.—W. G. Morris was elected mayor by a majority of 749 over E. F. Mason. A record vote was polled. Six aldermen were elected to police board, the former being: George Peterson, C. B. Hare, E. G. Bradburn, J. G. Duffus, J. A. McInerney and J. G. Graham. A. E. McIntyre, W. J. Johnston and B. Laster were defeated.

**Ottawa.**

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—A feature of the municipal elections here yesterday was the disqualification of hundreds of politicians and civil servants who have refused to pay their income taxes pending the completion of the arrangement between the Government and the city whereby civil servants will be immune from income tax on payment by the Government to the city of a lump sum.

No less persons than Hon. Wm. P. D. Foster, Hon. L. P. Brodeur, who denied the privilege of voting in Victoria ward in which the Parliament buildings are situated. They had not paid their income taxes and the officials at the polling booth refused to recognize them as voters. Mr. Brodeur had a property vote in another ward, but Mr. Pomeroy lives in apartments.

Mayor Charles Hopewell was re-elected by acclamation. Four controllers were elected as follows: Controller Hawley, 4,961; Ald. Hinchey, 4,472; Controller Davidson, 4,184; Controller Champagne, 3,394. Unsuccessful candidates were: McGrath, 3,567; Little, 3,097; Parent, 2,377; KIR, 921; Roberts, 676.

The aldermen are: Julien, Pinard, Cunningham, Caron, Forward, Boisevert, Carmichael, Nelson, Bower, Campbell, McDonald, Blinn, Stanley, Brown, Boucher, Black, Desjardins, Baxter.

Berlin, Ont. Jan. 4.—Only a third of the vote was polled, owing to the majority and three rejections given by acclamation. The aldermen elected were: E. G. Gardiner, E. W. Clement, W. D. Ealed, W. V. Utley, J. H. Keenan, W. R. Wilkinson, G. Rohlfsch, Jos. Winterhild, F. Roper, J. B. Sever, commission, E. Kraft and M. Dunham.

A plebiscite on whether Berlin's street railway system should be maintained by commission or a committee of the council resulted in an overwhelming majority in favor of the former.
