JAPAN APOLOGIZED.
Insulted the British Flag and Made Reparation.

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 31.-Advice
received from Tokio state that on
October 20th the British steamship
Thales left Tia Wan for Amoy, carry-
ing a number of Chinese passengers.
Suspecting that the Black Flag leader,
Lin Yung-fue was on board, the Japa-
nese man-of-war Yagayama stopped the
Thales on the high seas and searched her,
and would have removed seven of her pas-
sengers had not her master entered a very
strong protest.
The British Government immediately
demanded an explanation of this
breach of international law, and the
Japanese, with almost equal prompti-
tude, replied that the captain of the
Yagayama had exceeded instructions.
The impropriety of the act was ad-
mitted, expressions of regret were
tendered, and full compensation for the
detention of the steamship was offered.

Lord Salisbury accepted the declara-
tion, but intimated that another act
of reparation was needed, namely,
public saluting of the British flag.
After some discussion, however, Japan
was spared the humiliation in consid-
eration of publishing in the official
gazette her note of explanation.

London, Dec. 31.
TROOPS FOR CUBA.
Two thousand Spanish troops em-
barked at Cadiz last evening for
Cuba.

RESERVES CALLED OUT.
A Constantinople despatch says:-
"The army reserves at Moosh, Sardis,
Algharet and Bitlis have been called
out."

CHOLERA IN RUSSIA.
The Russian official cholera statis-
tics, for the week ending Dec. 27,
show 73 new cases and 50 deaths
from the disease.

BRITISH REVENUE.
The British treasury returns issued
to-night show that the net increase in
the revenue for three-quarters of the
financial year amounts to £6,387,008.

EARTHQUAKE IN ITALY.
An earthquake shook was felt on
Saturday at Ciciliano, in Caserta,
three miles north of Nola. Several
persons were killed and a number
were injured.

DEATH OF AN ACTRESS.
Lady Fanny Gregory, who some
years ago was one of the most ac-
complished and versatile actresses on
the English stage, died to-day. She
was better known to the theatrical
world as Mrs. Stirling.

THE DUCHESS VERY ILL.
The young Duchess of Marlborough
(nee Miss Consuelo Vanderbilt) is very
ill in Rome with typhoid fever, a
private letter received from there to-
day announces. The fever was con-
tracted while she was in Spain.

A GOOD APPOINTMENT.
The Daily News, commenting upon
the reported appointment of Justice
Brewer, of the United States Supreme
Court, as a member of the Venezue-
lan high commission, says that the
appointment is a sign that President
Cleveland wishes a fair report to be
made.

THE WAR IN ABYSSINIA.
The Italian Government is informed
that the additional reinforcements of
Italian troops sent to Abyssinia re-
cently have arrived at Massowah.
The Abyssinian army is quartered at
Dolo. The Italian troops are com-
pelled to send out columns for the
purpose of obtaining forage and pro-
visions, and many cases of dysentery
are reported among the men.

NEW YEAR'S HONORS.
In accordance with the usual cus-
tom of conferring honors on the oc-
casion of the new year, the Queen
has elevated to the Peerage Sir
Frederick Leighton, President of the
Royal Academy, and Henry Hicks
Gibbs, formerly member of the House
of Commons and lately a director of
the Bank of England, and has knighted
Hon. H. P. Crease, senior puisne
judge of British Columbia.

A DISABLED STEAMER.
The British steamer British Empire
(Captain Wills), from Boston, Decem-
ber 14, for London, which put into
Falmouth in a damaged condition,
the result of striking a rock off the
Scilly Islands during a dense fog, has
a fracture three feet by ten inches
in size in her No. 2 hold. She will
shift her lower hold cargo to between
decks. It is thought 800 tons of flour
in her cargo has been damaged.

ARMENIAN MASSACRES.
A Constantinople letter in the Times
this morning summarizes and tabu-
lates from Consular and other sources
the Armenian massacres in the last
two months. There are many places
from which there are no details yet,
but where known the total is 18,
000 killed. Turkish statistics give
killed in the town at 20,000, with
2,500 villages destroyed, and the num-
ber of killed in them unknown. It is
estimated that there are 425,000
starving.

THE POET LAUREATE.
Her Majesty has appointed Alfred
Austin poet laureate, an office which
has been vacant since the death of
Lord Tennyson, on Oct. 6, 1892. Alfred
Austin, the new poet laureate, is a
poet, critic and journalist. He was
born at Headingley, near Leeds, May
30, 1835. His father was a merchant
and magistrate of the borough of
Headingley. He took his degrees at
London in 1857 and in

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
