With Siege Guns. Shanhaikwan, May 12.—A report re-ceived from London that there has been fighting at Wufuling is discredit-ed here. It is reported that there is only a small Japanese force in that wichity. The main force of the Japa-nese is said to be concentrated near Port Arthur with siege guns, and their intention is believed to be to drive the Russian fleet out to battle.
