Deror William Is Dead. LONDON, March 5.—An alarming rumor of the death of Emperor William of Germany the death of Emperor William of Germany reached London in a private message this afternoon. It lacks confirmation, though the good faith of the 'sender is unquestionable. It is well known that the aged Kaiser's death is liable to occur suddenly. He is within seventeen days of completing his 90th year. His physical preservation has been marvelous and up to some five years since he seemed to have taken a lease of immortality.
