OTTAWA, May 30, 2:30 a.m.—Latest reports at 2 o'clock from Ennscliffe are that Sir John is resting quietly, breathing more regular. Still there is no revival of hope.

His Career. John Alexander Macdonald was born in Glasgow, Scotland, on January 11, 1815. He was second son of Mr. Hugh Macdonald, who lived originally in the parish of Dumfriesshire, but who removed to Canada in 1830.

Interprovincial Troubles. Between Upper and Lower Canada there was a growing grief of suspicion and enmity into the study of law. At school he had given no promise of the remarkable career he has run, being prominent only in mathematics.

Confederation a Fact. As historians will tell it, Sir John Macdonald who shaped this movement for the Confederation, conducted the negotiations in the Maritime Provinces and in England.

Parliament Meets. The report of the Royal Commission was laid before the House on May 23. The report was that Sir John Macdonald had been elected to the House of Commons in 1847.
