Merehants Who Cannot Make Financial Ends Meet.

A meeting of the creditors of C. M. Ansell, liquor merchant, of St. Thomas is to be held on Nov. 10.

It was agreed to accept 50 cents in the dollar, one-quarter paid down and the balance in two, four and six months secured.

The Canada Line, A. F. Webster, general steamship agent, corner of King and Yonge-streets, furnishes us with the following information regarding the Cunard Company's new steamer.

The Cunard line Company, the largest steamer in the world, was successfully launched from the Fairfield Company yard at Glasgow, Lady Bura, wife of the chairman of the Cunard Company, named the steamer.

The Commodore will be one of the two that have been ordered from the same shipbuilders for the service of the Cunard Company, and it is expected that she will be completed in time to make her first trip to New York in April next.

The opening of the Chicago Exhibition, The Great Eastern was 600 feet long by 80 feet broad. The Commodore is but 92 feet shorter and 8 feet narrower, and will weigh fully loaded with cargo, passengers, provisions, etc., a displacement of over 10,000 tons.

This is a displacement of at least 5,000 tons greater than that of any other merchant vessel of iron or steel in existence, it is anticipated that upon her completion it will be regarded as one of the wonders of the world.

Up to the present she has not been named. Her engines are ready for her, but no part of the hull has yet been built.

The machinery consists of two, phosphor-bronze screws driven by two pairs of triple-expansion engines, each capable of producing 10,000 horse-power. Each engine has two cranks and five cylinders.

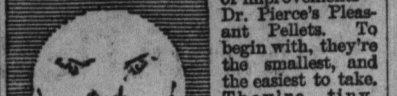
Two high-pressure cylinders will exhaust into an immediate cylinder, which will exhaust into two low-pressure cylinders, and the pistons of these last are on the same rods as the pistons of the high-pressure cylinders.

There will be 12 double-ported boilers, each with eight furnaces, and there will be six stoke holes, excepting her funnel, the vessel is entirely of British construction.

The rudder, formed of a single steel plate, is 12 feet long, 12 feet wide, and 12 feet thick.
