LIEUT. GOVERNOR'S DAY.

Populists of Toronto Church School Will Have An Annual Holiday.

A large assembly of prominent citizens, including Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Kirkpatrick, the Bishop of Toronto and Mrs. Sweetnam, Mr. Justice Oler and Mrs. Oler, Prof. Clark, Rev. Dr. Langtry, James F. Smith, J.C., and Mrs. Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Alan Macdonald, Mr. and Mrs. George S. Holmstead, and Mrs. Lockhart Gordon, the Rev. Messrs. Pearson, Boulden, Ashcroft, Dr. and Mrs. Moorehead, and Mrs. Adams Wright, Mr. G. W. Douglas, Messrs. Armour, Mr. Walter Cassels, Messrs. Cassels and others attended the annual prize-giving of the Toronto Church School at their schoolhouse in Alexander-street yesterday afternoon.

The Lieutenant-Governor expressed his pleasure at being present and hearing something of the working of this school, which has now taken such a prominent position among the educational institutions of the province. He remarked on the large number of sons of our prominent citizens who attended the school, and urged upon the boys the importance of making the most of the opportunities now open to them.

The Bishop of Toronto made reference to the large increase in the number of new boys during the past year, and attributed this to a good deal of confidence that the public had already begun to place in Mr. Aborn, the new headmaster. It was stated that over 25 new boys had joined the school this term, and that quite a number of others had promised to send their boys after the Christmas vacation.

Professor Clark, in his usual clear and happy manner, dwelt on the benefits of having a school like this in our midst, and pointed out the many advantages of being pupils of such a school.

Although the Public School system of this province was most admirable, he lacked religious training, and he had no doubt that the success referred to by the Bishop and the Honourable Lieutenant-Governor was owing to religious training being made a first consideration. He said that many of the boys would before long enter the different learned professions. He reminded the boys that to-day they were the day of the beloved physician, and he hoped that many of the boys would do their utmost to excel in that profession. The headmaster, having explained to the meeting the good work done at the school since he had joined, and the different changes he had made, handed the following list of prize-winners to the chairman.

BET SUGAR PROFITS.

California Can Supply Sugar for the West. Richard Gird, the owner of the Chino rancho, San Bernardino County, and principal owner of the enormous sugar factory at Chino, is at the Occidental. He says beet sugar making is a great success. About \$300,000 worth of improved machinery, including the Siemens process of extracting sugar from the molasses, has recently been put in, making the plant cost fully \$1,000,000.

There are, Mr. Gird says, 4000 acres of beets on the Chino rancho, and 2000 more in the vicinity. The crop will amount to about 55,000 or 60,000 tons. It would have reached 100,000 but for the dry weather. He says there is money in beet growing. The gross value per acre of the product of the beet land is from \$80 to \$90, and the net profit from \$30 to \$40. Last year he got 174,000 pounds of beet seed from abroad, mostly from France. This cost \$20,000.

There is enough good beet land in California, from San Francisco south, to supply sugar for the whole world, said Mr. Gird. "The consumption is increasing fast. Two years ago we used on this coast 30,000 tons of sugar. We are now using seventy pounds to make each person on the Pacific coast," said Mr. Gird.

Russian Poetry.

The Vossische Zeitung says that Russian society has begun to interest itself in its national living legends, of whom there are about 1000. The best known is a peasant named Prjabinin, who knows by heart some six thousand verses. Count Tolstoy, who saw him at Moscow at the end of last year, declared that a singer like Prjabinin was a phenomenon, and that he had never seen another like him. Still more was the old peasant woman, Irina Fedosova, who is scarcely known beyond her native village. She has written down and published by Prof. Barsov. Irina sings at weddings and at funerals in her native village. It is high time to save the songs for the future, and to save the legends for the present, even in the villages by the modern city. Peasants and soldiers returning from the front are helping to make the characteristic national songs and melodies disappear.

Cansels are quiet, closing to-day at 101 5/8 for money and at 101 3/8 for account.

Canadian Pacific firmers, closing in London to-day at 64 5/8. St. Paul closed at 61 7/8.

It is said that there will be gold shipments to New York on Saturday.

The strength in wheat to-day is put down to the report that the crops in Argentina have suffered seriously by rainstorms.

The traffic return of the Canadian Pacific for the week ended Oct. 14 is very encouraging. Total earnings were \$460,000, an increase of \$10,000 as compared with the corresponding week of last year. Grand Trunk earnings, \$408,102, for the same week, a decrease of \$67,240.

Business failures in Canada this week, according to the G. D. Dun & Co. report, were 10, as compared with 25 the same as last week, as compared with 25 the corresponding week of last year.

The clearings of Winnipeg banks this week are \$1,212,000.
