There can be little question that an electric portable fire engine would be efficient and thoroughly practical were the question of current supply settled, and were it not that this part of the outfit, if properly ins alled and used for the settled previous only would necessive the settled previous or the settled prev outfit, if properly ins alled and used for its special purpose only, would necessitate so great an outlay of money. But it is a bsolutely necessary that a separate plant should be installed for the electric engine system. Where a city or district is well supplied with electric lighting, railway or power mains, distributed tairly well, and all of the same nature and voltage, these could be used for current supply by connecting them at intervals with suitable trap or switch boxes, which able trap or switch boxes, which would be easily accessible, and to which the engine motor could be connected. Granites Win the Gov-General's Prize.



The result of this is the belts are more or less injured on the edges. All heavy machines should have shifters to act so that they shift the belt cover tendily. the belt over steadily, not putting too much strain on the driving belt too suddenly. Two pieces of gas-pipe just large enough to revolve on round iron supports for shifters will lessen the friction on the edges of heavy belts, as these pipes revolve while the belt is being shifted. It effects a great saving in long driving belts—in fact, any belt at all, leather or rubber.
