Head of Clothing Firm Says Trade Conditions In Many Lines Are Better

Jonathan Dowler Makes Optimistic Statements—Says Brighter Business Aspect Is On The Horizon.

The Border Cities Star, Windsor, carried the following interesting report on trade conditions as viewed by Jonathan Dowler, of R. H. & J. Dowler, Limited: "That conditions in the clothing business are on the incline, and, from his observations in other lines, was the opinion expressed this morning by Jonathan Dowler, of R. H. & J. Dowler, Limited.

"A brighter business aspect is on the horizon," he stated, "and within a few months this should be more evident. Conditions of the past few years have not been unusual, but better times are coming.

"In our business we are satisfied that conditions are better. Manufacturers and retailers have been selling to the edge for a long time, and by so doing have been able to compete with the clothes in the United States. We have, perhaps, the edge on them concerning quality, and we believe the values are as good, if not better.

It was stated at this morning's session that the styles in men's clothes for next spring will mark a slight change, running more toward the loose fitting type started by the Prince of Wales. It was made known that, although the prices in woollens and worsteds had advanced, there would be no change in prices on the spring styles. The Dowler firm having been able to purchase stock at present prices.

WILL CONFER ON LEVEL CROSSINGS

Kitchener Committee Given Assurance By C.N.R. Head

ADDRESSES CANADIAN CLUB
Cost of Five Subways Estimated At Half Million

KITCHENER, Oct. 30.—The railway committee of the City Council was given the assurance of the president of the Canadian National Railways, Sir Henry Thornton, to-day, that the railway officials would meet the city representatives in the near future with the view of arriving at an understanding over the city's level crossing problem, particularly King street. As soon as this has been reached the railway company will endeavor to secure the necessary funds from Parliament in order to make whatever expenditures may be necessary to carry out the plans.

The city's railway experts early this year proposed the building of five subways instead of only one, which would be at King street as has been previously proposed by the company. The company's officials wanted time to consider the cost-proposal and promised to meet the city's representatives later this year. The city wants this conference held in the near future. Henry, in looking over the plans was surprised at the estimated cost of the work, approximately \$500,000, exclusive of property damages, which it is claimed by the city would not be high. The president, however, pointed out that the situation in this city was only one of many that exist throughout Canada, a legacy of the old companies, and that it was impossible to meet all requests at once, even though the need might be urgent, as only Parliament could provide the necessary funds for capital expenditure.

Sir Henry's visit to the city was a sequel to the invitation from the Waterloo County Canadian Club, which he addressed this evening. The president of the Canadian National Railways was greeted by the largest crowd at any meeting of the club in many years. The president confined his remarks largely to the work of the Canadian railways and to the improved financial position, concluding with an appeal in the interests of immigration.

SARNIA PREPARES FOR CIVIC VOTING

Two Candidates Already In Field For Mayoralty.

VOTE ON MONEY BY-LAW
Will Also Decide Question of Reducing Council.

SARNIA, Oct. 30.—With the Ontario plebiscite and the elections in Great Britain now but history, Sarnia is getting itself for the civic elections on November 24, and so far there are but two mayoralty candidates in the field, Mr. James C. Barr and ex-Ald. George Lambert.

Five members of the Board of Education retire this year. They are W. S. Haney, M. L. A., W. T. Goodson, F. Towers, L. H. Richards and Rev. J. R. Hall. It is not known if they will seek re-election. W. H. Knox and O. F. Lewis are the retiring members of the Hydro Commission.

Two questions will be submitted to the ratepayers: Are you in favor of reducing the Municipal Council from 14 to eight members? Are you in favor of increasing the Auxiliary Police of the City of Sarnia, to cost approximately \$1,000?

A further drive by the police against violators of the Motor Vehicle Act was notified to-day when five Sarnians were fined \$5 and costs. Four were driving without proper lights and the other stepped too hard on the gas.

Interesting Sessions Held By West Middlesex Branch.

MOUNT BRIDGES, Oct. 30.—The autumn meeting of the Rural Deanery, of West Middlesex, and of the Deanery of the Auxiliary, was held at St. Jude's Church, Mount Bridges, on Wednesday, October 23. The day's program consisted of the celebration of Holy Communion, the recitation of the Eural Dean Coleby, being the celebrant, being assisted by the Rev. Capt. Pugsley, the latter who also preached an eloquent and impressive sermon.

At the business meeting following, held at the home of Mr. Wood, it was decided that the canvass for the earliest convenience of those interested.
