NEWS OF THE WORLD.

There were 121 cases of typhoid in the United States last year.

The net debt of the Dominion at the close of the last year was \$255,955,398.

The British Columbia Legislature opened on the 16th inst., when the Senate ministry met the House for the first time.

It is reported that a treaty of alliance has been signed between Russia and Afghanistan in spite of the opposition of Great Britain.

The Russian budget for 1899, is remarkable for the enormous expenditures on railways which amount to 99,000,000 rubles (76,229,000).

The new mail train from New York to Portland, Ore., makes the trip in four days, a reduction of 15 hours from former schedules time.

A British protestant has been proclaimed over the Sudan, and Lord Kitchener of Khartoum, the sole representative of the joint government.

The British diplomatic agent at Bagdad, Thomas Cremer, laid the foundation stone at Khartoum last Wednesday of the Gordon Memorial college.

France is still willing to give a subsidy of 400,000 francs for a direct line of steamers between Canada and France provided Canada does the same.

The Dominion immigration agent at Bagdad, Thomas Cremer, informs the department that he will take up a train load of settlers to Manitoba early in March.

The Dominion customs revenue for the first six months of the current fiscal year was \$12,559,829, an increase of \$2,374,146 over the same period of 1898.

Alderman Payment, by a solid Catholic vote, was elected Mayor of Toronto, on Jan. 2nd. A plebiscite in favor of Sunday streets was carried, 4685 to 2019.

British shipbuilding closed the year with about two million tons of work on hand, which is nearly four times the total tonnage built in all foreign countries in 1897.

A bill has been introduced in the United States Senate to provide electric cable between the United States and Hawaii, Japan, China, the Philippines, and Australia.

The new fast mail train between New York and San Francisco on Monday made the run from Erie to Cleveland a distance of 95 miles, in 104 minutes, including stops.

In accordance with a new year contract President Faure, of France, has ordered pardons or reduced sentences of six hundred forty-seven persons tried by military courts.

An American syndicate has obtained the right to build a railroad in Ecuador, connecting the sea coast belt with the rich interior acreage almost cut off from the outside world.

General Maximo Gomez has addressed a proclamation to the Cuban army advising against disobeying until the proceedings at Washington regarding the pay of the insurgent troops have been completed.

The Rev. Dr. Carmichael, general superintendent of the Methodist Church, announces that he considers the prospects for the raising of the twentieth century million dollar thanksgiving fund excellent.

Important! It is a remarkable fact that persons employed in match factories are prone to grip and other epidemic diseases. During the yellow fever in Memphis, Tenn., the agents and nurses of the Howard Benevolent Association escaped that fatal disease by using powdered sulphur in their shoes; and a distinguished German medical writer says that wearing sulphur in the shoes has proved a complete protective against cholera and other epidemic diseases. The workers in the sulphur mines in Italy escape the malarial which prevails all about them. The London Reg. Lancet declares that the sulphurous vapor produced by the combustion of coal in that city kills the disease germs in the atmosphere. Officers in the United States army say that with sulphur in their shoes the men had no fever, and it was also a protection against cholera. The opinion is expressed that where walnuts are prepared for the market, the shells are bleached by the use of bromine fumes. The men having charge of that work are never troubled by the grip, influenza or other epidemics which attack laborers otherwise employed. It is also said to be an effective remedy in various cases of rheumatism. Half a teaspoonful of powdered sulphur in the shoes or stockings is considered to be sufficient. The remedy is certainly simple enough and worthy of a trial.

West Indies Federation. "Federation or perdition" has been taken up as a cry in the British West Indies and the people are considering the proposition that they be incorporated with the Dominion. One paper, the "Federationist," published in St. George, Grenada, expresses the opinion that they "have reached that stage when commercial union with Canada forms one of the most important matters of consideration for the West Indies." And it further says: "Trade with Canada and absorption by Canada occupy the minds of every intelligent West Indian. The cost and burden of government are too great, and thoughtful people are inclined to the opinion that trade with Canada would lead to incorporation in the Dominion, and to a lessening or removal of those burdens which hamper the commerce of these islands and prevent their expansion." The future of the island is one of the most important questions that can engage the attention of Imperial statesmen, and some time is ripe for action. The longer it is delayed the stronger become the chances of these colonies becoming dependent on the mother States.
