

Mr. GRAYDON: It is nothing but Liberal party politics.

Mr. MACKENZIE KING: If that is so it is because the Liberal party is the only party in Canada that has placed social legislation on the statutes.

Mr. GRAYDON: The Prime Minister only believes that.

Mr. MACKENZIE KING: I believe that and—

Mr. GRAYDON: You are only whistling while you are going through the cemetery.

Mr. MACKENZIE KING: Every measure to which I have referred to-night has been a measure with which I have had a great deal to do, and for which I have had a large measure of responsibility. It has been part of a consistent endeavour on my part, as leader of a political party, to see that while need exists in the ranks of the less fortunate in our country, and while something can be done to ameliorate the burdens of the people, and while the opportunity to help is still ours, the party head, the Liberal party, should take all such

measures as would enable us to feel that by our fellow men we were doing our full duty in our day and generation.

Mr. GRAYDON: Mr. Speaker, I did not wish to interrupt the Prime Minister's remarks. May I just say that I do not believe—

Mr. SPEAKER: Order.

Mr. MACKENZIE KING: The hon. member has spoken.

Mr. GRAYDON: May I just say this, that you are very much afraid of John Bracken.

Motion agreed to, bill read a second time and the house went into committee thereon, Mr. Golding in the chair.

Mr. MACKENZIE KING: It is now five minutes to eleven. I would therefore move that the committee rise, report progress and ask leave to sit again.
