Hon. Judy V. LaMarsh (Secretary of State): I am informed by the Department of Public Printing and Stationery and the National Film Board as follows:

- 1. There is no book or pamphlet under preparation primarily concerned with the carvings in the houses of parliament. However, there is a prestige book entitled "Canada's Parliament Buildings" in preparation jointly by the National Film Board and the Department of Public Printing and Stationery. It will contain some reproductions of photographs of carvings.
- 2. This publication will illustrate the seat of the government of Canada. The character of the book will be to highlight the character of the parliament buildings through its architecture. It will contain numerous photographs illustrating heraldic motifs and significant architectural details.

- 4. The selection of photographs to be reproduced has not yet been made, it will be done on the basis of the historical and architectural aspects of the buildings.

The C.B.C. purchased the television rights to the interview with Victor Spencer from Jack Webster Productions Limited of Vancouver. Any fee paid Mr. Spencer for the interview would have been negotiated by Mr. Webster and the corporation has no official knowledge of any such transaction.

C.B.C. INTERVIEW WITH GERDA MUNSINGER

Question No. 1,080-Mr. Allard:

- 1. How much did the C.B.C. spend in order to obtain and produce a filmed interview in Munich with Mrs. Gerda Munsinger?
- 2. What was the amount of additional and special costs, either in salaries or travel expenses, that the C.B.C. paid to its regular or special employees, in order to reach this person and to interview her?
- 3. For what purpose was it decided to authorize these expenditures?

Hon. Judy V. LaMarsh (Secretary of State): 1. \$5,000 was paid to Mrs. Munsinger's agent and \$3,000 was paid to the Toronto Daily Star. The C.B.C. recovered \$2,000 through sale of the program material to the N.B.C. network in the United States.

- 2. The combined cost for transportation, staff expenses, etc., for coverage in Germany was \$3,050 for providing coverage on four networks, English and French, radio and television.
- 3. This had become a news story of the first importance, and a primary consideration was the Canadian people's right and need to be informed in the most direct way possible.
