#### PRICE OF GASOLINE IN VANCOUVER

**Mr. Ian Waddell (Vancouver-Kingsway):** Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources. Is the Minister aware that since her Government took office in September, 1984, that while world oil prices have continued to drop gasoline prices in her own riding of Vancouver Centre have risen—and if I can use the gallon figure—by 28 cents a gallon—

**Miss Carney:** —and did not provide any mechanism at all for price decreases if market prices dropped.

### PETRO-CANADA PRICING PRACTICES

**Mr. Ian Waddell (Vancouver-Kingsway):** Mr. Speaker, my supplementary question is for the Minister of Finance. Is the Minister aware that in his own riding of Etobicoke Centre Petro-Canada is, in fact, a price leader and that it charges 1.4 cents per litre more than the neighbouring Shell station on Renforth Drive? Will the Minister recommend to his cabinet colleagues that Petro-Canada be directed to take the lead in reducing gasoline prices for consumers rather than raising them?

**Hon. Michael Wilson (Minister of Finance):** Mr. Speaker, Petro-Canada has something in the order of 4,200 service stations right across the country.

Mr. Waddell: I'm talking about the one on Renforth Drive.

**Mr. Wilson (Etobicoke Centre):** They are vigorous participants in the market-place at each of those 4,200 locations. To give the Hon. Member an example of how vigorous a competitor Petro-Canada is, after this Government removed the Canadian Ownership Special Charge to reduce the price of

gasoline in July of last year, Petro-Canada was one of the first off the mark to reduce its own prices.

Mr. Waddell: Do it again!
