VALUE OF CANADIAN MINERAL PRODUCTION

Mr. Bill Tupper (Nepean—Carleton): Mr. Speaker, Canada is the third largest mineral producing country in the world. Each year it produces some \$15 billion of mineral products. That production comes from some 280 mines in 65 communities across the country. The industry creates some 400,000 jobs, and 80 per cent of our mineral production in Canada is exported.

Furthermore, last year the industry raised about 70 per cent of its funding for exploration through the flow-through share arrangement, a program that the Government has enhanced.

The Canadian mining industry and all Canadians are asking if the Liberal Party and New Democratic Party are abandoning the mining industry in Canada. They voted in the House against free trade with the United States, and many New Democrats are not supportive of our flow-through share program for financing the mining industry. Are these Parties abandoning such communities as Bathurst, Murdochville, Val d'Or, Sudbury, Timmins, Kirkland Lake, Esterhazy, and Mayo in Yukon Territory? My Party and the Government are not. We want to build the mining industry into a world-class industry and keep it there. That is the objective of our Party.

FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF CHERNOBYL NUCLEAR ACCIDENT

Mr. William G. Lesick (Edmonton East): Mr. Speaker, Sunday, April 26, 1987, will mark the first anniversary of one of the most tragic and frightening events in modern history, that of the Chernobyl nuclear accident in the Soviet Ukraine.

Literally tens of thousands of Ukrainian citizens will suffer from the after effects of the tragedy, with an estimated 6,500 cancer deaths over the next 50 years in 11 regions of the Soviet Union affected by the fallout.

Studies by the International Atomic Energy Agency have stated that between 5,000 and 150,000 extra cases of cancer will occur around the world during the next half century as a result of the Chernobyl accident.

Women who were pregnant and lived near the nuclear plant will have a 50 per cent greater chance of giving birth to mentally disabled children.

Nuclear energy and nuclear reactors are part of our lives, but they must be made safe for the future. For the sake of our children and for our future generations, it is imperative that we remember and learn from this senseless and careless tragedy.
