Hon. Mr. Macdonald: But inflation could prevent our resources from being fully developed and leave us with an insufficient

developmental processes set back for generations to come.

Hon. Mr. Horner: We could send for Dr. Schacht.

Hon. Mr. Macdonald: I do not know whom we would have to send for. But I point out to my honourable friend that economic conditions in Germany resulted in the Second World War. I am sure he would not want Germany's experience to be repeated in Canada. Indeed, I do not think any Canadian would support a leader who favoured a policy of unrestricted inflation.
