## WICKETS BETWEEN WINNIPEG AND THE CUP

Toronto's Sixth Wicket Put on Seventy-Five Runs or Result Would Be Hopeless.

There were all sorts of fireworks in the championship cricket match yesterday on Varsity campus between the Toronto C.C., holders, and Winnipeg Wanderers, the challengers. When stumps were drawn for the night Toronto's two innings were completed for a total of 217 runs against the Wanderers 128 for their first innings. Thus the western cricketers must make 90 runs today to carry the Ross Robertson cup back to Winnipeg and they have ten wickets to do it with.

Toronto batted first on a rather dry wicket and were all out for 81 runs. When the Wanderers replied with 128 the cup seemed to have started on its westward flight. But with five wickets down in Toronto's second innings for a paltry nine runs the cricket match seemed to have already started to carry out Horace Greeley's advice.

However, when Greene and Carter became partners it was another story. This pair played correct, careful and aggressive cricket, and they might be together yet, but in a moment of weakness the batsmen retired with the fielders to the pavilion for tea and the very first ball Carter's wicket. But before the interval had taken a joyful jump from 9 to 84 and the Toronto batsmen had a chance. Both men hit freely all round the field, each netting several boundaries. Greene was especially strong on the off side. He missed a number of leg strokes. He was not until after Norman Seagram had helped him to further raise the score to 118 that Greene returned a short pitched ball to the bowler. Bingham caught Seagram's wicket with the next ball, but Bobby Reade denied him the hat trick by curiously blocking the first. T. Saunders, a son of the veteran captain, stepped in to retire Bearer in the suburbs earlier in the innings, dropping an easy one from the Port Hope boy's bat at stumps leg.

Beverington, who has had Philadelphia experience, is the hope of the challengers. He put together 46 in fine style before Bearer clean bowled him. However, Bearer was late in going in or the result might have been different. He will likely go on this morning first in the attack. Bearer had the best bowling analysis of the day, six wickets for 27 runs, and this average for the second innings will beat the visitors.

Play is announced to start this morning at 10.30 o'clock. A large crowd yesterday enjoyed a most pleasant day's cricket in weather fine and warm under the trees on seats provided by the T.C.C. everything free. Following is the score:

## TENDERS CLOSED FOR PULP LIMITS

Successful Party Must Erect Five Hundred Thousand Dollar Mill.

Tenders for the government lease of the Lake of the Woods pulp limit closed last evening at 4 o'clock. The exact number of applicants is not obtainable, but it is understood that between five and ten are recorded.

The territory advertised for pulp purposes concerns a large strip tributary to the Lake of the Woods, in the Keeweenaw district. The successful tenderer will be required to erect a pulp mill at an ultimate cost of \$500,000. The daily pulp issue from the mill will be in the neighborhood of 75 tons and 127 hands on an average will be used through the year.

One important stipulation is that all the material used be made into paper in Canada, and that only such timbers capable for this purpose be cut. The
