Park Commissioner Chambers Psoriasis Has a Scheme to Make Beauty Spot of Stagnant Pool.

Catfish Pond is to be reclaimed and developed into a miniature Muskoka or Thousand Island Park, if the plan submitted by Parks Commissioner Chambers to the parks committee yesterday is finally adopted. At a total expenditure of \$31,072, the 15 acres of stagnant water will be so dredged as to make 10 acres of water and five of land; the latter constituting small islands dotted here and there

in amail islands dotted liete and there thruout the area.

It is proposed to dredge the pond to depth of four feet, and create the islands with the dredged material, converting the northern portion into an verting the nonthern portion into an aquatic garden, making connection with Grenadier Pond by a channel east and west, at the foot of the railway embankment. Boathouses, etc., would be erected on the east side of the pond. It is estimated that the dredging will cost \$12,500; the top dressing of the islands which are to be made, \$6897; four rustic bridges, \$500; one road bridge, \$3000; one boathouse, \$1200; aquatic garden, \$1375; total cost of constructing a roadway at the south end of the pond would be \$5600.


