GARMENT EMPLOYERS
REFUSE TO NEGOTIATE

The chief demand the garment workers are now making upon the employers is a 25 per cent. increase in wages. They also ask for the abolition of the piece work system and the system of fixing a minimum wage. James O. Merrick, secretary of the Employers' Association, stated that the employers "must absolutely come back on the terms under which they went out." He also stated that the employers will not negotiate on the wage increase.

They demand an increase of five cents per hour and declined to work for less. Today the carpenters on the job went out in sympathy.

U. S. SENATORS
TO MEET WILSON

Washington, Aug. 14.—President Wilson's offer to talk over the peace treaty with the senate foreign relations committee was accepted. At the suggestion of Republican members and by a virtually unanimous vote, the committee decided to inform the president that they would meet him at his convenience to go over disputed points in the treaty and the league of nations covenant. At the same time the committee decided to call additional witnesses and continue its hearings. The committee in its acceptance of the president's offer, stipulated that it was not to be a matter of secrecy on the discussion, the members preferring to be free to use as they saw fit, any information the president might impart. It also left the way open for him to either receive the committee at the White House or come before it at the capital. Chairman Lodge's letter of notification said the committee members would meet Mr. Wilson at any time or place he might select.

PLANE KILLS CHILDREN.

Baltimore, Aug. 14.—Three children were killed in Patterson Park today when an airplane of the 38th Aero Squadron stationed at Langley Field, Va., crashed into a fence, behind which were several hundred spectators. Seven were injured.

HUNGARIAN MINISTER RESIGNS.

Vienna, Aug. 14.—Wilhelm Boehm, Hungarian minister at Vienna, has resigned. He was formerly minister of war under the Emperor Karl. He was appointed Hungarian minister at Vienna in July last.

WORKMEN IMPRISONED.

London, Aug. 14.—A number of women have been imprisoned in St. George's Castle, Belfast, on charges of today, charged with circulating Bolshevik propaganda among the Polish troops.

TEXTILE WAGES INCREASE.

Wage increases in some 20 departments of 15 per cent. in the textile trades, have been agreed by the Textile Workers' Union of America. The union, which is the largest in the textile industry, is now in a position to make a strong case for its demands. It is hoped the entire schedule would be completed by September 1st.
