A general increase in duties against foreign countries would therefore, not be burdensome to consumers provided a moderate tariff is maintained on British goods. In other words, the British preference will act as a safety valve. There are cases where British competition is un-fairly pressing the Canadian pro-ducer, and a higher minimum, duty may be necessary to save a Cana-dian industry from extinction, but, speaking generally, we think the wise plan is to maintain moderate duties on British imports, while making the tariff on foreign goods much higher.
