



Carvassing and Bribery. J. W. Cheeseworth opined that it might be found necessary to resort to party poli-tics in municipal affairs as procection against such thetics when initiated by op-ponents. He believed, however, that the abelition of canvassing would have the most salutary effect in clearing the political atmosphere. Canvassing toos away from the voter part of the ilberty that the secret ballot was supposed to afford, and 80 per cent, of the rampant bribery and corrup-tion was due to its baleful influence. If a man were not asked for his vote, he could not put a price on it. The knowledge that large sums of money had to be personally put up by candidates for office was a dis-contagement to many good men to enter parliamentary contests. W. A. Worreil took another view of the origin of the evit. He traced the corrup-tion of the electorate to the runds furnisa-ed by government contractors, wao sup-ported the party in power in return for its avors.

George Neale, late of London, England, avowed himself a believer in the value of the canvass as an honest means of innuenc-ing the voter. W. A. Sherwood believed in taking up the gaunitlet if the other side threw it down, but didn't taink the Liberais would make any such move in a city where there was such a preponderance of Conservative voters. It spoke well for the magnanimity of Conservatives that in the past as many Liberais as Conservatives had been elected to the mayor's chair. **Party Politics in Municipal Election** The corruption fund came from the con-

Party Politics in Municipal Election The corruption fund came from the con-tractors, but primarily from the govern-ment coffers, asserted R. H. Elliott, if it were hard to prevent bribery, it would be infinitely harder to prevent canvassing. There'was no single municipality ware the Liberals had a majority tuat they didn't elect a Liberal to civic office. Party lines in municipal elections would do away with a vast amount of hypocrisy. "We are running them on party lines, anyway. Why not do so openly?" queried J. G. Loftus. The chairman frowned uncompromisingly upon the principle of recognizing partynsm in civic politics. The Conservatives had shown good sense in the past in electing Liberal mayors at times. "If party lines will get in better men than the present board of control, let us have them," exclaimed Mr. Earngey with fervor.
