SOME GAS TACTICS.

Pointers for the Members of the Legislature.

HOW CONSUMERS ARE WRONGED.

The Province Also Affected by the Overcharges.

Where the Company's Money Has Gone—It Has Been Spent in an Extensive and Useless Plant—The Legislature Asked to Have the Citizens of Toronto From the Gas Monopoly, but the Company is Conducting an Active Lobby—What Will the Patrons Do?

The Gas Company has transferred its operations from the City Hall to the Parliament buildings, and is using its powerful influence to prevent the Legislature from empowering the City of Toronto to assist the Johnston action, the object of which is to force the company to obey the law and to reduce the price of gas. The citizens of Toronto since 1887 have been systematically defrauded by this grasping corporation, and if members of the Legislature live in Toronto and were forced to pay outrageous gas bills, they would readily understand why citizens are so anxious to encourage any proceedings that would save them from the gas monopoly.

The Company Violates the Law.

Judge Ferguson, in his judgment in the present action, holds that the company has violated the Provincial Act, 50 Vic., chap. 85, passed in 1887. The City Auditor estimates that had the act been obeyed gas would be about 30 per cent cheaper. If the judgment is finally sustained, not only will this large reduction be gained, but the overcharges since 1887, amounting to about \$500,000, will be repaid.

Gas in Toronto is \$1.05 per 1000 cubic feet.

It should not exceed \$0.75 per 1000 cubic feet. In Washington, D.C., a company has just applied for incorporation offering to supply that city with gas at 50 cents per 1000 cubic feet, and is willing to be bound in a bond to any amount that gas shall not exceed 70 cents per 1000 cubic feet.

The Corporation of Toronto Pays about \$7000 per year to the Gas Company for light and heat in public buildings.

There are about 20,000 gas consumers in Toronto. A \$10 gas bill should be considered a heavy one. The company's annual profit is \$1,000,000, and the shares were selling at a premium of 20 per cent. The company is not satisfied with this handsome profit, and is endeavoring to increase the stock to \$1,000,000, and to allot the new shares to the directors and shareholders, thus making them a present of the premiums. The company's representatives are doing their utmost to grab the premiums on the new stock, but Mayor Howard and the city's representatives are opposing this legislation on the ground that profits were limited to 10 per cent, and insisted that the premiums should be given to the shareholders, and should be applied to reduce the price of gas.

ARE OTTAWANS JEALOUS? THE BOOTHS AND THE ARMY.

"God's American Volunteers" is the Name of Ballington's New American Organization in the United States—The Name of the Salvation Army.

New York, March 14.—"God's American Volunteers" is the name of Commander Booth's new organization of the Salvation Army. The name was decided on to-day, and announced to the newspaper reporters by Commander Booth himself. A standard has also been designed for the G. A. V.

Commander Booth gave a public audience to the reporters. In commenting on the facts briefly stated above, he made a speech. He said, in part: "The time has now arrived when we feel warranted in announcing the name that has been selected for the movement. We have decided to call it 'God's American Volunteers' and the symbol letters will be shown. We have also decided on a flag. The standard of God's American Volunteers will be a white field, emblematic of purity, and in the centre a single star, emblematic of unity. Centrally placed within the radius of the star is a white cross, emblematic of sacrifice. Above the star is the motto, 'The Lord My King.' Below it are the words, 'Post, sed non tacebo.' The flag is a long blue banner, showing in the center a white star, representative of the 45 States of the Union. The star will be surrounded by a golden wreath, signifying that the truth represented by the motto will prevail for all time."

Canada's Mineral Resources.

ANOTHER VIEW OF THE BRITISH ADVANCE ON DONGOLA.

Michel Lefebvre & Co., the well-known vinegar manufacturers and proprietors of the Berthier Beet-Root Sugar concern, have been obliged to assign, owing to the difficulties created by the suspension of the Banque du Peuple.
