France, where a good deal of silver was coined early in the year, and the French purchases rose from £277.145 in 1897 to £839,104 this year. On the other hand Russia, having substantially completed the coinage of new silver rubles, took only £706.508 this year against £2,057,833 in 1897.

The present strength of the market seems to be based on a demand, which is essentially temporary in its nature, and a drop to the level of the earlier months of the year is very likely to follow. There is no extraordinary demand from the East, and no apparent occasion for any. Nor is there anywhere in sight an unusual call for silver, except that from Spain, to which we have already referred; and it is not possible that it can last long, since the funds for extensive purchases are lacking. It seems to me rumor rather than actual buying which has caused the late rise in price.
