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THE QUESTION OF THE HOUR.

The feature of the British elections is

the wonderful strength developed by Jo-

seph Chamberlain. He is the genius of the

Imperialistic movement, but he has taken

care all along to keep himself in reserve,

and to hold himself down, as it were, for fear

of appearing too far in advance of public

sentiment. The elections just held dis-

close the fact that the people are really

in advance of Mr. Chamberlain on the

question of Imperialism. They not only

endorse all that the Colonial Secretary

has done, but they have amended their man-

date enjoining him to advance as far as

he pleases in the development of his Im-

perial policy. Mr. Chamberlain, who is

the embodiment of the Imperialistic idea,

is to-day the man of destiny in the eyes

of the British public. The Ulsteria Tangle

that he is desirous of reaching to the

consolidation, the creation of a great and

homogeneous British Empire, Mr. Cham-

berlain has not given us a detailed out-

line of the modus operandi he has in

view for consolidating the Empire, but he

has said enough to let the public know

that the tariffs of the Mother Coun-

try and the colonies will play an impor-

tant role in the work of consolidation.

It is well known that Mr. Chamberlain's

idea of consolidating the British Empire

involves such a modification of the vari-

ous tariffs within the Empire as will re-

sult in inter-Imperial trade. Whether the

modification should take the form of a

tariff, with absolute free trade within

the Empire or of preferential tariffs by

means of which each state in the Empire

will enjoy a preference over foreign coun-

tries in all the other states, is a matter

for future discussion. Which of these pro-

jects Mr. Chamberlain might prefer we

do not pretend to know, but certain it is

that his plan of Imperial consolidation is

based on inter-Imperial tariff preferences

of some kind. The London Times, com-

menting on the extraordinary popularity

of the Colonial Secretary, as evidenced in

many ways during the pending elections,

states that the question of Imperial tariffs

will occupy the attention of the new Im-

perial Parliament.

The triumph of the imperial movement

in Great Britain is a matter of supreme

importance to Canada. We can recall no

other event in Imperial politics fraught

with such pregnant opportunities for the

Dominion of Canada and the other col-

onies of the Empire. Besides the glory and

prestige that would accrue to this coun-

try by becoming more closely identified

with the British Empire, Canada would

have a preference in the markets of a

country which consumes \$600,000,000

worth of the very articles that Canada

is specially adapted to produce. But in

order to effect Imperial consolidation and

to secure Imperial preferential trade, it

will be necessary for the colonies to co-

operate with the Mother Country. Mr.

Chamberlain has taken the ground that

the initiative on this question ought to be

taken by the colonies. He prefers that they

should set the pace. He understands the

sentiment of the British public, and

as soon as he realizes that the peo-

ple of the colonies are in accord with that

sentiment he will be prepared to proceed

with his scheme of consolidation. But he

is averse to forcing or dragging the

colonies into the scheme. They must act

spontaneously and of their own free will.

It is just here that the policies of the two

parties in Canada become all-important.

The people of Canada are now called upon

to decide whether or not they favor Im-

perial consolidation as championed by Mr.

Chamberlain. If so, it remains for them

to decide which of the two political par-

ties the better represents the opinion of

the people of this country. On this point,

we think, there is no difference of opinion.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has done all he can

to discourage Mr. Chamberlain in his

work of Imperial consolidation. He has

told the people of Great Britain that Can-

ada believes in free trade and that an

Imperial protectionist tariff would be pre-

judicial to the best interests of both the

Mother Country and the colonies. He has

said that it would be a mistake for Great

Britain to impose a tax on its breadstuffs

and that Canada does not desire or expect

any preference in the markets of Great

Britain. The Liberal Government has

placed itself on record as being opposed to

the working out of Imperial consolidation

on the lines suggested by the Secretary

of State for the Colonies. The Conservative

party, on the other hand, is right in line

with Mr. Chamberlain's ideas. The party's

platform contains planks approving of im-

perial consolidation and of the adoption of

a policy which will ensure the safety of

the great confederacy of nations

over which the British flag flies. We

quote from Sir Charles Tupper's recent

manifesto:
