LOCAL MARKET.

London, Wednesday, Sept. 11.
There was not much doing in any line
at the market today, as with the excep-
tion of fruit, there was hardly anything
offered.

For the three loads of hay on the stand
sales were brisk at \$14 to \$15 per ton.
One load of old oats were offered, which
sold at \$1 50 per cwt.

WEEKLY REVIEW.

While there were no new features at the
markets held here during the past week,
there was a good demand for all the farm
produce and fruit that was offered; in
fact, the only lines in which sales were at
all drags were potatoes and apples.

There was not much change in prices
from those paid in the previous week.
Hay and straw—The demand for hay is
good, and prices are firm at \$14 to \$15
per ton. Straw is a trifle slow at \$5 and
occasionally \$6 50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—The supply of butter
is hardly sufficient for the brisk demand;
sales are made at 22c for choice crocks
and 22c to 23c for pound rolls in basket
lots. Eggs are firm, at 17c for crates and
18c for basket lots.

Poultry—The demand is good at present,
but the dealers say that prices will ease
off shortly; spring chickens are selling at
10c per lb alive and 12c dressed; old fowl,
1c per lb alive and 8 1/2c to 9c dressed;
ducks are slow at 8c per lb alive and 10c
dressed; turkeys are in fair demand, at
12c per lb alive and 15c dressed.

Potatoes—Sales are slow, there being too
many offered at present; prices are easier,
at 9c to \$1 per bag and 70c to 75c per bu.
Fruits—Apples are dull and prices lower;
sales are made at 50c to \$1 per bu, ac-
cording to quality; peaches sell at 50c to
\$1 per basket for common and \$1 50 for
fancy; plums range in price from 60c to
81c per basket; muskmelons, 50c to 25c each;
citrons, 12c to 15c each.

Dressed Hogs—The demand is fair, at
\$8 50 to \$9 per cwt.

Bad Weather Failed to Spoil the Day; Crowds Enjoyed the Fair Yesterday

Judging of Live Stock Proved a Big Feature of the Great Exhibition.

In spite of the fact that the weather yesterday was the worst it possibly could be, there was a large crowd on the Western Fair grounds, much larger than would be imagined under such circumstances.

The rain started early in the day, and kept it up all the way. The race track was a sea of mud, and made racing out of the question. The attractions on the stand had to be cut out. The fireworks were out of the question entirely. There was nothing in front of the stand to please the spectators, except the judging of the horses.

This was carried through without interruption, however, and last night saw a large number of the horses judged. And the horses made a splendid showing. The fine animals of Hon. and Mrs. Adam Beck, Miss Kate Wilks, of Galt; Mr. Yeager, of Simcoe; Mr. St. Clair, of Aylmer, in the light classes, made a sight worth going miles to see. They were simply splendid.

The heavy horses and general purpose classes are strong also, and the lover of a good horse had all he could admire. This exhibit will certainly make the Fair of 1907 notable.

The crowd amused itself in many ways. Large numbers went through the Palace time after time, and seemed to enjoy themselves listening to the music, and in other ways. The majority of the occupants of the Palace report business good in spite of the weather, and the consequent small crowd.

Plenty of Music.

The Seventh Band and the Muncie Indian Band furnished the music yesterday, and were well received.

The dog show had a large attendance yesterday. The bow-wow seemed to be having a great time, if one is to judge from the noise they made. Some very fine dogs are shown, especially in the collie and bulldog classes.

Last night there was quite a crowd in the grandstand. The full list of attractions were given, and although everything was wet, all seemed to enjoy themselves. The Midway drew a bunch, and the Palace was jammed.

THE LIVE STOCK.

In the Live Stock Department yesterday very little was doing owing to the downpour of rain that lasted from 9 o'clock in the morning till 5 in the afternoon. It was almost impossible to make any progress placing the awards, and there were only a few ribbons placed. Today will, no doubt, finish the judging.

CATTLE.

A number of attempts were made to get through the judging in this class, but the rain fell in torrents at times and compelled everybody to make for shelter.

In Herford's there was a grand exhibit, many noted breeders competing. T. Skippon, Hyde Park; J. A. Gov-
enlock, Forest, exhibited fourteen head
O'Neill Bros., Southgate, and Hunt-
& Son, Orangeville, also had big
exhibits.

The Herfords are considered by many to be the best beef cattle today in Canada. Of course, that is largely a matter of taste. Their beautiful white faces and dark brown bodies give them a very pleasing and striking appearance.

In Shorthorns (always admired for their size and beef qualities) some grand specimens were exhibited.
John Lee, of Highgate, and Kyle Bros., of Ayr, were the principal exhibitors. John Isaac placed the ribbons in this class.

AYRSHIRES.

This grand old breed from Bonnie Scotland still keep up their reputation as the greatest of milk producers.
Two fine herds are on exhibition by Mr. Hume and Stewart & Son, from Menzies, Ont.

Aberdeen Angus and Galloways are worthy of special mention.
John Lowe, Elora, exhibits a fine herd of Aberdeen Angus, and D. McCrae, of Guelph, a splendid lot of Galloways.

Capt. Thomas Robson placed the awards on Herfords, Aberdeen Angus and Galloway.

POULTRY.

In the Poultry Department the judging was completed yesterday morning and everything was in shape for the visitors.

Owing to the wet day a great many of the sightseers kept to the building. The halls were comfortably filled all afternoon, a great many noted breeders from outside places being present.

A Mr. Colley, from faraway Kansas, came all that distance to visit the London poultry exhibit. Hearing through the poultry press of the success of London exhibitors in all parts of the United States, he decided to visit the real thing, and get all the pointers he could on the quality of our poultry exhibits. He was agreeably surprised, and carried back with him many names of successful breeders. Space will not permit of an extended report of winners.

Light Brahmas is the best exhibit for some years, Mrs. Waters, of St. Thomas, and Sage, of London, getting the lion's share of the prizes. Cochins are a fine class; all the prizes went to Londoners.
Buff Orpingtons—A very large entry, especially in young chicks. A new exhibitor from Sebringville captured everything in young stock with very fine specimens.
Black Orpingtons—Another grand exhibit. J. R. Hamilton, London, won the lion's share in old stock, and Kemp and Waterman took everything in sight in youngsters.
White Rocks, Barred Rocks and Buff Rocks were a show in themselves. The winners were mostly London men.
The pigeon wing of the building is certainly worth the price of admission just to examine carefully each different section and note the different shapes, colors, etc.
The Western Ontario Pigeon Fanciers' Association will hold their annual meeting tonight at 8 o'clock, when all matters pertaining to the advancement of the pigeon industry will be discussed and officers elected for the ensuing year.

PRISONER CARRIES PISTOL

Shot a Woman in Court Room, and Then Got Away.

Niagara Falls, Sept. 10.—Yesterday afternoon Bert Carpenter went to the house of Mrs. Elizabeth Creighton, 30 years old, at Lewiston, and, on refusing to admit him, he kicked the door

in. Later he was arrested, and spent the night in the lock-up.
This morning Carpenter was arraigned in the police court, and sentenced to 60 days in the Niagara county jail.

As he was being taken from the courtroom he met Mrs. Creighton, and, before the officers could prevent it, he shot her through the body. The woman was brought to a hospital in this city in a serious condition.
During the excitement Carpenter escaped, but a posse of citizens are in pursuit of him.

BLOCKING THE STREETS.

Paris, Ont., Sept. 11.—Chief Macfarland had Conductor James Johnston, of the G. T. R., before Mayor Patterson, police magistrate, for obstructing the Market street crossing for twenty minutes. He was fined \$14.75 in all. Another summons will be issued tomorrow, and the police are now determined to enforce the law in this respect, as G. T. R. officials are going too far.
