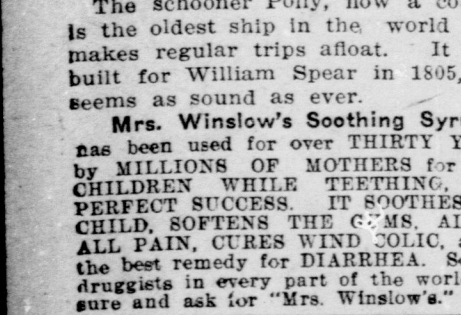

Smith Bros., plumbers, who had the contract for putting in the services in the Bank of Commerce building, protested against the account of \$107.07 charged against them by the commission, on account of the expense caused by the opening of the street.

The firm claimed that Superintendent Moore had estimated \$75.

POSTAGE REDUCTION

Cheaper Letter Rates to Great Britain and Elsewhere.

There is much important new information in the October local Postoffice Guide issued by London postoffice. Regulations as to Yukon winter mails; particulars as to extension of Special Delivery system; and announcement of further postage reduction. The postage on letters to Great Britain, Egypt and all parts of the British Empire, except Australia and Rhodesia, which has hitherto been 2 cents per half ounce, or fraction thereof, will be 2 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. Since Australia and Rhodesia have not yet signified their adherence to this change in the unit of weight, the rate on letters to those colonies will be as hitherto, 2 cents per half ounce or fraction thereof. The postage on letters to all postal union countries, with the exception of Great Britain and the British colonies mentioned in the foregoing paragraph, of the United States, Mexico and Egypt, will be 5 cents for each letter weighing one ounce or less. On letters weighing more than an ounce, the postage will be 5 cents for the first ounce, and 3 cents for each subsequent ounce or fraction of an ounce. Copies of the October Postoffice Guide may be obtained gratuitously, on application, or at general delivery wicket.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Oct. 2.—Bishop Yalter Selzer, of Jamestown, N. Y., who has been presiding at the Free Methodist Conference for Northern Indiana, greatly excited the members of the local Free Methodist Church here by a sermon predicting the end of the world within a few months. He did not mean, he said, that the planet was to be destroyed, but that all the works of man were to be swept away and Christ was to come a second time to rebuild it and make it a fit place for the dwelling of the Holy Spirit.

ALL NAVIES NEED DREADNAUGHTS

London, Oct. 2.—With the Dreadnaught a new era in naval construction has admittedly begun.
