MAY LOSE ARMS: OLD BLOW BLAMED

Tragical Outcome of a Brutal Assault, by Farmer on Hired Man.

Albert Hughes, a young man 29 years of age, was this morning brought from the House of Refuge, Strathroy, to Victoria Hospital, where he may have both arms

The case is one of the saddest that has ret come to the attention of the hospital

Hughes came to Canada from England ago-when he had just passed his 17th to load a wagon, and when the farmer returned and found that the boy had not made as much headway as he might have, he was asked for an explanation. Hughes complained of a pain in one arm, whereupon his employer seized a manure fork, and in a fit of rage struck him a blow across the arm, causing a fracture of the bone above the elbow. Hughes' employer was not satisfied at that, for he locked Hughes in a room in the house for ten days before allowing him to consult a physician. When at last Hughes saw a doctor, an effort was made to set the broken arm, but the young man always suffered considerable pain. Hughes eventually went into business in Wardsville, where he remained for ten years, being compelled to retire about two years ago, owing to epilepsy, said to have been the result of the assault committed by the farmer. At first only the arm which was broken was affected, but gradually the disease Imperial Male Quartet Returns After a found its way into the other arm, until now Hughes is unable to do anything for himself. He spent some time in the Epileptle Hospital at Woodstock; later was taken into a home in this city, and later was re-

Hughes now has to carry a block of wood In each hand to prevent his nails cutting into the flesh. The pain which he suffers at times is so intense that it brings on attacks of epilepsy. The physicians at the hospital will watch his case closely

for a time before deciding on what course to pursue. It may be decided to amputate both arms.
