## MAKE LEFT-OVERS INTO FRITTERS

Fresh Fried Fritters Fine Food for Frosty Days.

Particularly tempting for luncheon or supper, these cold winter days, are fritters of various sorts. Once you have had good success with any of the "left-overs" you will be wanting to try others. Apple fritters are good ones to start on. Peel the apples, remove the core, and cut in thick slices, crosswise; sprinkle with sugar and let lie for an hour; make a fritter batter the same as you would for griddle cakes, dip each piece of apple in batter, and fry until a golden color, in hot fat. Serve hot, sprinkled with sugar.

Use left-overs. The remains of a can of corn may be made into very delicious fritters simply by mixing the vegetables with the batter and frying. Other vegetables may also be used. Boiled carrots or parsnips, sliced, may be dipped in the

batter, and slices of bacon treated in the same way, make very excellent fritters. Sweet ones may be made by frittering fruit into the batter, or using sliced bananas. Serve syrup with these last.
