Judging by all the advance notices now at hand, the battle around shortstop will be between Art Fletcher and Buck Weaver, with young Risberg only

an outside chance.

Weaver is a star. There is no chance to leave him off the line-up, and as McMullen has been playing as well at third and tapping the ball with such daily consistency, there is very little chance that he will be dropped to leave Weaver at third, with Risberg in at short.

Fletcher, as a rule, is good for .285 or .295. This season he has spent most to the year under .280.

Weaver, a brilliant infielder, is an inspiration to his club. He is an eternal hustler, and his battling spirit has been a big factor in gearing up the Chicago machine.

Fletcher, as announced above, is a player of the same mold—one of the bardest workers and one of the best fighters in the game.

Yet, with all their brilliancy and effectiveness in other ways, neither Weaver nor Fletcher is a safe world series type.

Neither has the dependable steadiness of an Everett Scott or a Peckin-paugh. They can go far—they can go both ways—but being inlaid with so

Borden Administration May Go Into Fight With the Present Line-Up.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Ottawa Sept. 26.—Fremier Borden will be back from his fishing trip early next week. The dissolution of Parliament will be one of the first things that will engage his attention. Parliament would be dissolved by statute on Ortober 7, but the Government does not propose to let the law take its course in this case, and will have the Governor-General take action and dissolve the House.

The date of election has not been fixed or even calculated. The preparations for taking the votes at home or abroad have not advanced sufficiently to enable the Government to calculate the date of polling. Still it is not believed that the prediction of Sir George Foster will be realized, and the election held as at as February.

January seems the favorite date for the event.

Hon. Arthur Meighen has returned to Ottawa, and Sir George Foster will be back on Friday.

Government reorganization now is not expected till after this election. According to general belief the Administration will go into the fight with its present line-up. Inside organization for the election is now being pushed.
