IN THE PAST YEAR

No Mention of Dividends Made
in Financial Report.

WANT INCREASED FARES

Council Will Again Be Asked
To Sanction Higher
Rates.

The financial statement for the year 1918 of the London Street Railway Company, which was presented at the annual meeting of the shareholders yesterday afternoon shows a net income for the year of \$15,290.39, which was transferred to the surplus account. The statement makes no mention of any dividends. The net income before deducting anything for depreciation was \$44,498.84, as compared with \$47,720 for the year 1917.

The gross earnings for 1918 were \$456,255.91, an increase of \$38,493.55 over those of 1917. The operating expenses for last year were \$373,125.78, being an increase of \$42,029.43 over the cost of operation in 1917. There was a decrease in the power bill for 1918 of \$1,648.34 over 1917.

It was decided to renew the request of last year for increased rates, and a statement is in course of preparation for presentation to the city council at an early date. **LABOR COUNCIL TO
BACK VETERANS IN
OUSTING THE ALIENS**

Not a Dissenting Voice Greeted
Fred Young's Proposal.

WANT LABOR SUNDAY

Ministerial Alliance Will Be
Asked To Take Up the
Movement.

To back up the Great War Veterans' Association in its action to turn out when the opportunity comes, the forerunners who are holding down jobs in this city while returning soldiers are walking the streets without positions, was the decision of the trades and labor council last evening.

Delegate Fred Young asked that the council be ready to stand shoulder to shoulder with the returned men when the time comes. "It's up to us to get these aliens put out," he said. There followed a general outburst of applause, and when the motion was put, there was not a dissenting voice.

One soldier, it was mentioned, had left this city, in which he had owned a little cottage and garden. When he returned a farmer was living in the house and the little garden in which he had worked before he went overseas was now being cultivated by the alien. This alien also had a good job, while the soldier, who was a true Britisher and had fought bravely for his country on the fields of Flanders, was walking the streets.

Would Include Scabs.

Delegate R. H. Hessel thought that the motion should go so far as to include "scabs" who were holding down jobs which should be held by union men. He said that the work on the huts at Carling Heights was done by men who were working from nine to fourteen hours per day, and who were also working on Sunday. Some men were working from nine to twelve hours on Sunday, but when it came to London it knew it had the whip hand and it was in favor of it.

There was much opposition voiced in regard to Mayor Somerville's proposal to do away with the municipal coal yard. Delegates Hessel, Brennan and O'Dea all were strongly opposed.

Delegate Hessel contended that the municipal coal yard was a paying investment, in spite of the opposition from certain city hall officials. He stated that if the movement was to the advantage of a party of businessmen that the mayor would be in favor of it, but that everything on the labor slate was opposed by the city hall. An illustration of what was being done, or rather, not done, in regard to labor suggestions, he mentioned the movement for free textbooks, which was allowed to drop.

On the suggestion of Delegate O'Dea it was decided to protest the action of the mayor and to have No. 1 committee of the trades and labor council back up the protest.

Attend Church.

A resolution, heartily endorsing the action of and thanking Rev. W. R. McIntosh, Rector of St. Andrew's, for his action in his stand in backing up labor, was passed. Rev. Mr. McIntosh was stated to be in sympathy with his action, the finances of his parish, but, despite the opposition which he had met with, he was proceeding to give his series of talks in favor of labor at the church, King Street Presbyterian, on Sunday evening, when he will speak on "The Church and the Job." All union men are invited to the service, and also to ask the ministerial alliance to inaugurate a Labor Sunday for all churches in the city.

The matter of whether or not union labor was in favor of the suggested saving plan was referred back to the various unions.

The council declared in favor of an eight-hour day without reduction of wages.

A mass meeting to promote the labor movement will be held in this city on Saturday. Although the place where it will be held has not yet been picked out, it is thought that it will either be the Masonic Temple or the auditorium. Among the speakers suggested by the mass meeting committee were: Bishop M. F. Fallon, Rev. D. C. McGregor, Rev. W. R. McIntosh and R. H. Hessel.

Co-operative Store.

The committee which is investigating the matter of organizing a co-operative store here suggested that Sgt. John Glennie, a returned man, who at one time conducted one of these stores at Lethbridge, be invited to speak at the next meeting of the council. It was decided to act on the suggestion.

On the suggestion received in a communication, the council decided that the organization committee should help the telephone girls to organize. It was said that they had been hampered whenever they tried to organize.

The financial statement showed that the total income of the council amounted to \$1,311.40, that the total expenses amounted to \$1,143.84. The labor temple fund is now \$2,212.34. The council owns \$1,500 worth of Victory bonds.

A CORRECTION.
