SAM CARTER, M.P.P., WILL RUN AGAIN IN SOUTH WELLINGTON

At Least Three, and Possibly Four, Candidates Will Be in Contest.

GUELPH, Sept. 9.—Sam Carter, M.P.P., the Liberal representative in the Ontario House for South Wellington, will again be a candidate for the Legislature in the next election. Word to this effect has been received from Mr. Carter, who is in England by officials of the South Wellington Reform Association.

At a meeting of the Liberal executive held some weeks ago Mr. Carter's candidature was endorsed, and a cable was sent him asking him if he would again accept the Liberal nomination. He was asked to indicate that the "United Farmers" had nominated J. A. Cockburn to contest the riding. An answer has been received from Mr. Carter saying he will stand for re-election. Mr. Carter added in his letter that he was not sure that he would be able to secure passage for home until September 16, although he was making efforts to sail at an earlier date.

Will Call Convention.
A Liberal convention will be called soon after Mr. Carter returns to Guelph.

Three-Cornered Fight.
With the assurance that Mr. Carter being a candidate it is certain the contest in South Wellington will be a three-cornered one at least, with the possibility of a fourth candidate. Although the Conservatives have made no official move yet, several names of probable candidates are heard on the streets. Those mentioned are Col. Cogan, Ald. Hanniman and Archdeacon Mackintosh, president of the local branch of the G. W. V. A.

Some time ago there was a strong feeling among the labor men that they should have a candidate in the field for the provincial election, and at that time Thomas Hall's name was mentioned as the labor standard-bearer.

THREE-CORNERED FIGHT IN FRONTENAC COUNTY IS NOW INDICATED

KINGSTON, Sept. 9.—The indications are that there will be a three-cornered, possibly a four-cornered, fight in the county provincial elections. The United Farmers at their meeting on Saturday expressed the opinion that the time was ripe for a farmers' candidate in the county, and Reeve George Clark of the township of Kingston offered himself for election. M. H. Rankin, the present member for Frontenac, will be a candidate for re-election, and Dr. Sanker, of Wolfe Island, has been asked by many of his friends to enter the field. The fourth candidate may be James Halliday, Liberal candidate in the last Dominion elections, who has been asked by many to allow his name to be entered in the political field again.

NATION-WIDE STRIKE OF MINERS UNLESS DEMANDS GRANTED

November 1 Set as Time Limit For Reaching a Settlement.

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 9.—President John L. Leids, in his report to the convention of the United Mineworkers of America here today, discussed the greatly increased cost of living and the

probability of any sweeping reduction through "belated" federal action as a preface to his recommendation for a cancellation of the Washington wage agreement in the bituminous field not later than November 1, and the negotiation of a new wage scale, to be enforced in case of failure to reach a satisfactory settlement by that time by a general miners' strike throughout the entire jurisdiction of the United Mineworkers of America.

The basis of the proposed agreement should be that outlined by the national policy meeting held at Indianapolis in March, calling for the six-hour day and five-day week and "substantial" wage increases.
